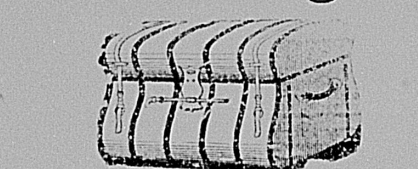

For the badly drawn ordinance by
which the water works company is
enabled to increase the tariff for water
at such altitudinous prices, a republican
major and council are now receiving the
curse of many citizens. Some assert
that the ordinance was passed and be-
came a law when Tom Stilwell was
mayor. He asserts, however, that the
administration following him—which
was that of Russell—is the one upon
whom the blame should be placed for
the high rates for water that the com-
pany is charging. Anyhow it is all re-
publican, whether Stilwell or Russell
were foremost in urging their adoption.

REPRESENTATIVE BROOKSHIRE correct-
ly voices the sentiments of his consti-
tuents in urging as he did last week with
other western representatives, the Presi-
dent to sign the seigniorage bill, which
would add \$55,000,000 in silver to our
circulating medium. The west does
not fear an over supply of silver money.
The east does, for its capitalists could
not then control the money market as
they do now with gold as the single
standard of money.

The Senate is just getting ready to
take hold of the Wilson tariff bill after
it has been in the hands of the commit-
tee for over two months. It seems prob-
able that it will be under discussion for
the next four months and before it is
ready for the signature of the President
half the summer will be over. It is
such operations as this that give the
country such a disgust and contempt for
the managers of the Senate.

Now if Harrison can get some college
or Y. M. C. Association in the south to
engage him to deliver a course of lec-
tures on "constitutional law" between
now and the next national republican
nominating convention, his boom for re-
nomination for President, will look real
encouraging.

Prospective Democratic Candidates.

The republicans hold their nomi-
nating county election early in June.
The democrats will not probably select
a ticket until August. Hence there is
no hurry on the part of the candidates
of the latter party to announce their
names. There will be for the various
county offices quite a number of candi-
dates of the democracy but not so many
as in some former years. If the new fee
and salary law continues in force, as
some think it will, candidates will be
fewer. The present emoluments of
most of the county offices are not at all
satisfactory to most aspirants. There
is a belief, however, that the next legis-
late will so amend the law that these
positions will next year have more money
in them, and this without question
is the inducement with many candi-
dates that moves them to ask positions
at the election in November next.

For the office of Auditor on the democ-
ratic ticket there will this year be
three candidates at least, viz. Benton Say-
der, Ripley tp., James Johnson of Walnut
and Wm. Hunt, present surveyor, of
Crawfordville. Any of these would be
satisfactory to the party, as anyone of
them could fill the office with credit to
himself. If the present salary law re-
mains in force and either of them should
be elected he will receive \$2,000 per year
only, out of which he must pay two or
three deputies.

For Sheriff, it is said, that John P.
Bible of Coal Creek, will be again a
candidate. He made a good official be-
fore. It is also reported that Lew
Dickerson, of the Tannenbaum clothing
house, will "shy his castor" in the ring
and aim to secure the position. The
name of Cliff Hill, a substantial farmer
and first class citizen, living southeast
of Ladoga, has frequently been men-
tioned for the place.

For Treasurer, Ben Warbington, the
present efficient deputy in the Treasur-
er's office, will seek the position. Mr.
Merrill of Waynetown, who is held in
esteem by his neighbors of Wayne town-
ship, will also, we learn, be a candidate
for Treasurer. This office under the
new law is said to be the most remun-
erative of any, yet at the same time the
responsibilities are much greater.

There are two Commissioners to elect,
one each for the 1st and 2d districts.
John Pullen, the present incumbent as
Commissioner from the 2d district,
on being asked the other day if he would
be a candidate said he did not know.
We have heard of no aspirants for the
place unless he may be one. The re-
publicans have four candidates for Com-
missioners at this time from this dis-
trict.

Hon. D. V. McCallister will be a can-
didate for re-nomination for Represent-
ative in the State legislature. If there
are any other names mentioned we have
not heard of them. The offices of Sur-
veyor, Prosecuting Attorney, Coroner
and other various positions, will be to
fill this fall, and new men will be chosen,
but who are candidates for these places
we have not learned.

Summer Normal.

Beginning July 16, there will be in
Walash college building, a six weeks
review term for teachers and those pre-
paring to teach. The common branches
will be thoroughly reviewed, and special
instruction offered in higher English,
Reading and Elocution, and methods
of teaching. For this work it is to be
expected to secure the service of masters
of their subjects, whose names will soon
be announced. County Supt. J. S.

Zuck has consented to give at least one
lesson per week in arithmetical methods.
Members of the college faculty will
supplement the works in common
branches, with lectures in their respec-
tive departments. Arrangements are
made by which good board can be had
at \$1.75 to \$2.50 per week.
