LA PEARL AT DANVILLE

Auspicious Opening of the Season of '94
—Larger and Grander Than Ever.

The fourth grand opening of LaPearl's big railroad show and trained animal exhibition occurred at Danville, Ill., last Friday and Saturday, April 20 and 21. A New Methodist Church.

An important meeting was held at the residence of Andrew Mount in Longview, Monday evening. The object was to take steps looking to the building of a new house of worship to be located in the west end of the city. The presiding elders, H. M. Middleton, of Greencastle and Rev. A. W. Wood, of LaPort, and others from abroad, were present, being called here to organize a program for the Epworth Leagues of the district. A communication from Mrs. Joseph Miligan was read in which she reiterated the statement made soon after the death of Mr. Miligan to donate a lot in the Miligan addition on which to build a church building. This was but following out the wishes expressed by Mr. Miligan before his death. If, however, it is not deemed advisable to locate the new church in that immediate vicinity, Mrs. Miligan will pay in cash an amount equivalent to the value of the lot and perhaps more. A committee of seven, with Dr. Tucker as chairman, was appointed to take the matter under advisement and report later.

That a new edifice of some kind will be built soon, there is little doubt. From the expressions uttered at Monday night's meeting, the prospects are that a tabernacle will be erected; something that will accommodate a large number of people at a moderate cost. This could be replaced by a more substantial edifice whenever the conditions would justify such a change. By a careful estimate of the people in and adjoining the city who attend church here, it was found that the congregations would soon outgrow the accommodations of our present houses of worship. For this reason a tabernacle, considering the cost, would be the most advisable structure to build at the present time. The committee will carefully weigh all these matters before making a report, which will be awaited with interest.

As to the Keeping of the Record of the City Council.

The present city administration certainly conducts business in a very loose manner. We want to call attention to the way in which the record of the common council is made. If record it may be called, a year or so ago the council made an order that twenty-five leadets, or copies of each regular meeting of said body be printed for the use of the members. The order was made that the members might always have at hand the proceedings of each regular session without having the trouble of going to the clerk's record, which we are not objecting to at this time. We might add in passing, however, that the cost of printing these special copies cost something like \$200 or more per year, and was never let out to the lowest bidder according to law.

Here is the point we wish to emphasize. You can't go to the clerk's office to day and find there an official record of the common council proceedings. True, you will find the leadets mentioned if some one member of them is not out or misplaced. An official and properly signed record should always be found at the clerk's office for the inspection and examination of the citizen, but such is not the case at the present time.

Just who is culpable for this gross carelessness The Review does not undertake to say, but we repeat that it is certainly a loose way of conducting the city's business.
