## THE DEMOCRATIC TAX LAW.

Its Benefits Pointed out by a Writer  
Who Knows.

The republican party of late is having  
a great deal to say about the democratic  
tax law of 1891. In its platform of 1892  
it uses this language: "We arraign the  
democratic party of Indiana for enacting  
an unequal and unjust tax law. It  
imposes upon the farmer, laborer and  
householder an excessive burden."

Again in 1894 the republican party in  
its platform denounces the same tax  
law "as being unequal, unjust and in-  
famous by creating higher valuations  
and higher taxes upon the farmer, the  
laborer and householder and demands  
that a reform in the mode of valuation  
and that the grading of property shall  
be changed. The republican party has  
fought this "democratic tax law in every  
 conceivable form. It has about made it  
a party issue in the country, and now  
since the Supreme Court of the United  
States has held the law constitutional and  
has declared it to be a just and equitable  
law for the assessment of taxes. Sever-  
al other states have adopted the Indiana  
tax law in substance as one of the best  
laws that has been formulated. It has  
placed an equal amount of the burden  
of taxes upon all property, whether it is  
owned by the poor farmer, the poor la-  
borer, or the poor householder, or the  
rich capitalist or corporation, yet the  
republican party of Indiana stands  
pledged to repeal and modify this law  
so as to let the capitalist and corpora-  
tion escape their just portion of the  
taxes.

Among the seven or eight thousand  
tax payers in Montgomery county there  
are only two or three parties who have  
taken any exceptions to the "democratic  
tax law," and they are railroad corpora-  
tions whose property had (prior to the  
present tax law) been assessed at about  
thirty per cent. of its value and is now  
assessed at not to exceed sixty to seven-  
ty per cent. of its actual value.

These railroads were assessed at about  
\$820,000 under the old law and under  
the then ratio of taxation paid into the  
county treasury about \$12,000 per year,  
while under the present law they are  
assessed at about \$2,000,000 and pay into  
the county treasury about \$25,000 per  
annum, or an increase of about \$13,000  
per annum.

This has been done under the equita-  
ble rule as has been said by the Supreme  
court of the "democratic tax law" that  
the republican party in Indiana seeks  
to denounce as "iniquitous." This demo-  
cratic tax law has decreased the taxes  
on the farmer and poor laborer in this  
county from an average in 1890 of \$1.33  
on the one hundred dollars to an aver-  
age of \$1.22, or a decrease of fourteen  
cents on the hundred dollars under this  
democratic tax law.

We will make a few illustrations:  
First, a man who in 1890 was assessed  
for \$25,245 on which sum he paid in  
taxes the sum of \$119.54. This same  
man in 1893 was assessed on \$47,030—  
almost double the amount of 1890—and  
yet he only paid on that amount the  
sum of \$45.08, or only an increase of  
\$25.54 in taxes on almost double the  
amount of property assessed.

Take another case where a man was  
assessed in 1890 on \$4,040 worth of prop-  
erty, on which he paid taxes amounting  
to the sum of \$65.50, and this same man  
in 1891 paid taxes on the sum of \$5,350,  
under this democratic tax law the sum  
of \$57.78, so that with \$1,320 more prop-  
erty he paid \$7.72 less taxes under the  
present law than under the former law.

These illustrations will hold good  
throughout the entire tax list of this coun-  
ty, notwithstanding the fact that the  
republicans stand pledged to condemn  
it as an infamous tax law.

## FOR STATE BANKING.

NUMEROUS PLANS OF ITS AD-  
VOCATES.

The Many Different Ideas Discourage  
Friends of the Measure—Sugar to Be  
Discussed in the Senate This Week—  
Bankers Talk of Bonds.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The outlook  
for the week in the house of representa-  
tives is so much in doubt that a  
democratic caucus may be necessary to  
agree on a plan of action on the state  
bank question. The debate has shown  
the state bank men that they are  
liable to be defeated by inability to  
agree on any one of the many plans  
discussed. As the state bank princi-  
ple was incorporated in the demo-  
cratic national platform, the lead-  
ers are loath to see the bill defeated,  
so that a caucus may be called for the  
purpose of formulating a party meas-  
ure. It is probable the final vote on  
the bill will be taken early in the  
week, unless the whole question is al-  
lowed to go over until a caucus com-  
mittee can frame a satisfactory bill. The  
rules committee is considering the  
advisability of giving one day to  
representative Cooper's bill for sub-  
jecting greenbacks, and Sherman  
notes to state and local taxation.

The sugar schedule will again this  
week be the central point around  
which the proceedings in the senate  
will revolve. Among other lines of  
policy which have been discussed  
among the opponents of the bill is  
that of allowing the sugar schedule to  
be accepted as amended by the com-  
mittee on finance without taking any  
vote on the schedule in committee of  
the whole, the object being that the  
opponents of the bill shall not be  
forced to show their hands at this  
time.

Senator Harris adheres to his deter-  
mination to ask the senate to prolong  
its daily sessions into the evening, be-  
ginning with today. Some of the re-  
publican senators have taken his no-  
tice to mean that he will ask the sen-  
ate to sit Monday until the sugar  
schedule shall be disposed of, but con-  
versation with him and with other  
democratic senators indicates that  
his purpose is hardly so definite,  
but that the intention is  
to press as near to the goal as  
it may be possible to do. The re-  
publicans will probably resist the attempt  
to extend the sessions beyond 10 o'clock  
to the extent of at least demanding  
that a quorum be maintained, and  
some of them will decline to assist in  
making a quorum. The democrats  
have the pledges of more than fifty  
senators, including most of the popu-  
lists and some republicans, that they  
will remain to aid in making a quorum  
as long as may be required. Mean-  
time they will maintain their efforts  
to get the republicans to agree to fix a  
day for the final vote.

**Hawaii's Contest With England.**  
WASHINGTON, June 4.—Necker  
Island, the prize for which Hawaiian  
advisers intimate the provisional gov-  
ernment and England are striving in  
an ocean race between the steamer  
Hawaii and H. M. S. Champion, has  
been the subject of considerable dis-  
cussion in the last two years. The  
island was for a long time in disputed  
possession of Americans interested in  
an island venture, and when it was  
announced some time ago that the  
English flag had been raised over the  
little domain in the Pacific England's  
policy was severely denounced. The  
island is described as being a lagoon  
island with a reef of quadrilateral  
form. Fish abound of a superior  
quality, and birds are extremely num-  
erous.

**Bankers and the New Bond Issue.**  
CHICAGO, June 4.—Local bankers  
offer a good deal in their opinions of  
Secretary Carlisle's proposed new issue  
of bonds. All are agreed that the  
government must either issue them or  
"go broke," but there it ends. Lyman  
J. Gage thinks there will be a good  
deal of difficulty experienced in selling  
the bonds. He thinks Chicago will  
take few, if any of them. J. J. Mitchell  
says he thinks the bonds will sell  
readily and that Chicago can be  
counted on to take from \$5,000,000 to  
\$10,000,000 worth. J. J. P. Odell thinks  
the bonds will sell slowly and that  
Chicago will not want any.

**The Indian Appropriation Bill.**  
WASHINGTON, June 4.—Chairman  
Holman of the Indian committee is  
pressing with the Indian appropri-  
ation bill, and its consideration will  
come immediately after the state bank  
debate unless Mr. Cooper secures an  
intervening day for his greenback tax  
bills. The Indian bill will be warmly  
discussed, as there is a disposition to  
question the wisdom of many of Mr.  
Holman's reductions. The debate is  
expected to last a week.

**In Honor of Gen. Neal Dow.**  
NEW YORK, June 4.—The interna-  
tional temperance congress convenes  
at 10 a. m. in the big tabernacle in  
Prohibition park, Staten Island. At  
the principal meeting held yesterday  
afternoon Gen. Neal Dow of Maine was  
the most conspicuous figure. The  
venerable apostle of temperance sat  
in the center of the platform in a big  
rocking chair which was covered with  
roses. Especial honor was paid Gen.  
Dow because the gathering delegates  
were celebrating the forty-third anni-  
versary of the signing of the first pro-  
hibitory law in Maine.

**Senator Gorman Has a Few Visitors.**  
BALTIMORE, Md., June 4.—Mrs. Gor-  
man said yesterday the senator is so  
much better that he spent part of the  
morning on the porch and later  
received a few visitors. Typhoid  
symptoms have disappeared, and the  
only unfavorable condition is weak-  
ness. His appetite is good.
