The Farmers' Insurance Company.

WOMEN RULE A CITY.

LAWLESSNESS PREVAILS AT
MILWAUKEE, WIS.

Mobs of Women Drive Away Health
Officers With Clubs—Authorities Sur-
render—Epidemic May Result—General
News of Northwest.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 30.—The
women in the smallpox infected dis-
trict ran riot unchecked yesterday.
Quarantine officers were driven from
the houses which they were guarding
and no attempts have been made to
check the infuriated mobs. These
women seem to be organized and
are determined to resist all
efforts of the health department
to remove patients or quaran-
tine affected houses. The women are
all armed with baseball bats and
wear white caps. About 400 paraded
through Fifteenth, Sixteenth and Sev-
enteenth avenues and drove the quar-
antine officers from their posts. At
2 o'clock in the afternoon the health
department temporarily abandoned the attempt to
quarantine and remove patients to the
isolation hospital or to investigate
new cases in the Eleventh ward. Even
the patients from other sections of
the city were not removed because it
was feared the ambulance would be
wrecked when it passed through the
ward on its way to the isolation hospital.

Judge Wallber let off the rioters
who were arrested Aug. 9 without
punishment and discharged Fred
Rosenberg, the man who was ar-
rested for urging the women to
attack the police. The police
were discouraged at the discharge
of the prisoner and have lost
heart in the work of trying to pre-
serve order. The health department
is being sharply criticized by the peo-
ple for the weak and vacillating policy
which has marked its handling of
the smallpox epidemic. Promises
were made that the disease
would be confined and would
not become epidemic, but now,
according to the admission of
Dr. Kempster, it is getting beyond
control and many are the demands
which have been made that he should
either resign or be removed from
office. The state board of health will
probably take charge of the situation
in this city to-day.

To Instruct Pupils in Temperance.

VALPARAISO, Ind., Aug. 30.—The W.
C. T. U. societies of Indiana will start
a petition in every town and will en-
deavor to secure 1,000,000 signatures
to induce the next legislature to pass
a law requiring scientific temperance
instruction, showing the effects of
alcoholic drink upon the human sys-
tem, shall be made a regular branch
of instruction for all pupils of schools
supported by public money or under
state control.

Driven From Their Home.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Aug. 30.—White-
caps went to the house of William
Hendershott at Agency Ford last
night and took Hendershott and his
wife out of the house and into the
woods, where a can of tar and some
feathers had been concealed. The
couple were finally released on
promising to leave the state. They
left in the morning. They are the
parents of the two youngest horse
thieves in the state.

Wanted by Three Banks for Forgery.

OTTUMWA, Iowa, Aug. 30.—Conrad
Reiter has been arrested at Brownin,
Mo., and taken to Kossuth for trial.
He forged a check for \$300 and
successfully passed it on the Kossuth
state bank. A bank at Fair-
field was caught for \$1,000 and one of
the national banks in this city for
\$2,500.

Elevator Company Sues for \$85,000.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Aug. 30.—The
State Elevator company is suing the
city of Minneapolis for \$85,000 dam-
ages. It is alleged its elevator has
been made insecure by the removal of
dirt by the Great Northern road. The
city is sued on the ground that the
railway company was granted per-
mission to perform the work.

Notorious Horse thief Caught.

OMAKOSH, Wis., Aug. 30.—B. F.
Landis was arrested here for horse
stealing ten years ago in Ohio. He
has served two terms for a similar
offense and eight years ago sawed his
way out of the jail at Greenville,
Ohio. He was taken back to Green-
ville.

Old Soldiers of Green Castle, Ind.

GREEN CASTLE, Ind., Aug. 30.—The
joint camp fires of the Fourteenth,
Forty-third, Seventy-first, and One
Hundred and Twenty-third Indiana
volunteer regiments was held in
McHenry hall last night. The regiments
brought together over 400 old
members.

Gen. Alger's Nephew Drowned.

HANNIBAL, Mo., Aug. 30.—Alexander,
the 12-year-old son of Mr. and
Mrs. C. M. Alger, was drowned in the
Mississippi river yesterday while in
swimming with other boys. The body
was recovered a short time afterward.
C. M. Alger is a brother of Gen. Rus-
sell Alger.

Veterans at Clinton, Iowa.

CLINTON, Iowa, Aug. 30.—The
seventh annual reunion of the Jackson
County Veterans' association opened
yesterday at Preston with
3,000 people in attendance. It is the
largest gathering in the history of the
association.

Families Forced from Their Homes.

BAY CITY, Mich., Aug. 30.—Eight
families living in Beaver township
have been forced out of their homes
by forest fires, and sought shelter in
Kawkawlin village.
