WANTS A NEW CONSTITUTION.

Representative Howe, of Morgan
county, has introduced a bill in the
House to amend the constitution as to
membership of the Senate and House,
changing their manner of election and
asking for a call of a constitutional con-
vention. In introducing his resolution
Mr. Howe said: "The progressiveness
of the State of Indiana, during the past
forty years has rendered almost obsolete
the constitution which was adopted in
1852, and it is now wholly inadequate to
the needs of this State. When, in 1852,
the constitution, as originally drafted
and adopted in 1816, was amended to
meet the new and additional require-
ments, the State had materially advanced,
and this rendered the change neces-
sary. This advancement has been
going on to an even greater degree dur-
ing the past forty years and we are in
need of a new constitution. Amend-
ments are being offered in the vain hope
of patching up the old one, and I think
the time has arrived for a new constitu-
tion."

"For instance, the time allotted for
the sessions of the legislature is not
sufficient and we are, in all probability,
compelled to pass a resolution extend-
ing the time in order to transact the
necessary business. As we are here on a
per diem salary we are thrown under
the imputation of merely extending the
time in order to get more salary, whereas
if the new constitution were adopted
giving us sufficient time to transact our
business, this would not be."

NEW JERSEY.

A certain Congressman, no matter
who he is, except that he is not a west-
ern man, was making up a list of towns
in the neighborhood of Philadelphia,
where he was to make some campaign
speeches previous to Nov. 6, 1894. After
he had made out to his satisfaction,
he handed the list to his secretary to
copy. The secretary, who is a pretty
shrewd politician himself, ran his eye
down the column.

"What's the matter with Trenton?" he
asked in some astonishment.

"Nothing," replied the member some-
what astonished. "Why?"

"I guess not," protested the member,
in doubt.

"Well, look at it yourself," and the
secretary handed the list to him.

He looked at it and there in plain let-

houses with but little opposition.

DELAWARE'S GOVERNOR.

Speaking of Delaware's new Governor
who was inaugurated last week a special
says: "Delaware inaugurated a Gov-
ernor-to-day who can neither read nor
write. For the first time in the history
of the State there was no inaugural ad-
dress, and this set people to inquiring.
Joshua Marvil was the republican can-
didate last fall and was elected. He is a
business man of good repute and worth
at least \$150,000, which he made by hard
work and shrewd investments. Marvil
can sign his name and that is all. Know-
ing his weakness he secured the ser-
vices of N. P. Smithers, a leading
lawyer, as Secretary of State, and
Smithers will virtually be the Gov-
ernor."

It is dollars to buttons that the ne-
farious Wishard apportionment monstros-
ity will never pass the House of Repre-
sentatives. The ring that framed the
bill was careful to take care of every
Senator, but not one thought was given
to members of the lower house who
were left to shift for themselves. It is
evident the ring presumed too much on
the ignorance of, as they are pleased to
term them, the "country bumpkins" who
compose the lower house, for they are
up in arms and a bitter war is on.
It was a good pole with which to stir up
the monkeys and democrats are watch-
ing the show with hilarious satisfaction.

CARLISLE'S CURRENCY BILL.

Ever since Carlisle recommended a
change in our currency system Congress
has been aiming to pass a bill in con-
sonance with his suggestions. It seems,
however, like lost labor, and nothing has
been done or likely will be done at the
present session of Congress. There is a
wonderful dearth of knowledge on the
coming question among the law makers.
If, however, the question was perma-
nently settled or for a decade at least,
business of all kinds would increase.
Until then we have little belief that it
will be.

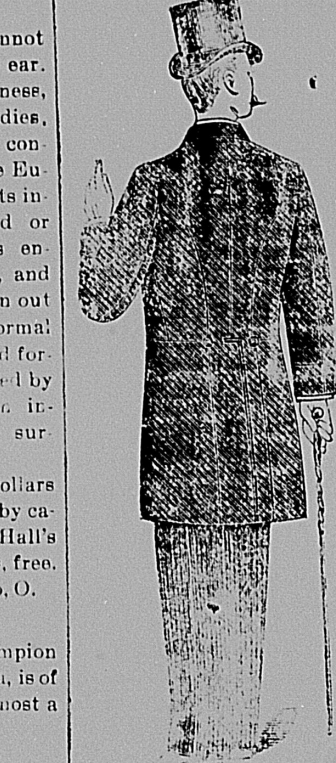
