### WANTS A NEW CONSTITUTION.

Representative Howe, of Morgan  
county, has introduced a bill in the  
House to amend the constitution as to  
membership of the Senate and House,  
changing their manner of election and  
asking for a call of a constitutional con-  
vention. In introducing his resolution  
Mr. Howe said: "The progressiveness  
of the State of Indiana during the past  
forty years has rendered almost obsolete  
the constitution which was adopted in  
1852, and it is now wholly inadequate to  
the needs of this State. When, in 1852,  
the constitution, as originally drafted and  
adopted in 1816, was amended to  
meet the new and additional require-  
ments, the State had materially advanced,  
and this rendered the change necessary.  
This advancement has been  
going on to an even greater degree dur-  
ing the past forty years and we are in  
need of a new constitution. An amend-  
ment is being offered in the vain hope  
of patching up the old one, and I think  
the time has arrived for a new constitu-  
tion."

"For instance, the time allotted for  
the sessions of the legislature is not  
sufficient and we are, in all probability,  
compelled to pass a resolution extending  
the time in order to transact the  
necessary business. As we are here on  
a per diem salary we are thrown under  
the imputation of merely extending the  
time in order to get more salary, whereas  
if the new constitution were adopted  
giving us sufficient time to transact our  
business, this would not be."

### NEW JERSEY.
