FACTS FOR CONSIDERATION.

Some Plain Statements Regarding
the Financial Question.

To the Editor of the REVIEW.

In reading the newspapers it seems
that the "money question, the silver
question" is the main issue now before
the people, and the Sentinel, the Indian-
apolis Journal and many newspapers
purporting to be republican and demo-
crat journals all seem to have bolted
their several parties and seem to have
formed a new party, "the Gold or Gold-
bug English party," for no such thing as
a gold sound money party ever existed
in America unless it has been recently
formed by Bynum, Carlisle, Sherman,
Harrison & Co. It is well to notice the
declaration of the two great political
parties on this question and it will
show that these gold papers and gold
advocates have left their former demo-
cratic and republican parties and now
accuse those who still stand on demo-
crat or republican "money" principles as
declared by the parties in their con-
ventions, as having "left the party and
gone after the silver craze." In the
national democratic platform of 1884,
the democrat money plank is as fol-
lows:

"We believe in honest money, the
gold and silver coinage of the constitu-
tion, and circulating medium converti-
ble into such money without loss."

And in the republican national plat-
form of 1884, the money plank of the re-
publican party was as follows:

We always recommend the best money
known to the civilized world, and we
urge that an effort be made to unite all
commercial nations in the establish-
ment of the international standard
which shall fix for all, the relative value
of gold and silver coinage."

But the country that elected Grover
Cleveland endorsed the democrat theory
"gold and silver coinage of the constitu-
tion."

And in 1888 the national democrat
party at St. Louis by the first plank in
the platform adopted the platform of
1884 on the money question above set
forth, and in 1888 the national republi-
can platform of that year contained the
following declaration:

"The republican party is in favor of
the use of both gold and silver as mon-
ey, and condemns the policy of the demo-
cratic administration in its efforts to
demonetize silver."

In 1892 the democratic party in its
national platform, paragraph 7, said:
"we denounce the republican legislation
known as the Sherman act of 1890 as a
cowardly makeshift. We hold to the
use of both gold and silver as standard
money of the country, and to the coin-
age of both gold and silver without dis-
crimination against either metal of
charge for mintage."

This is where democrats now stand,
and it is not democrats that denounce
people as silver cranks who still stand
on the declared democratic principles.
In 1892 the national republican plat-
form contained a declaration as follows:
"The American people from tradition
and interest favor bimetalism, and the
republican party demand the use of
both gold and silver as standard mon-
ey."

Thus it will be seen that both the
great parties were in 1892 what the
gold bug papers now denounce as "sil-
ver cranks," as ran off after the "silver
craze." Oh! what a bosh; it is the old
cry of "stop thief." Those who now ad-
vocate the single gold standard have
bolted the democrat and republican
party and seem to have joined the Bar-
on Rothschild, Grover Cleveland and
John Sherman's English Wall street
party, and are now accusing others of
leaving the party. If they will turn the
magnifying glass and look in at the
other end they will see themselves out
of the party. But this is not all. In
1892 the Indiana state platform of the
democratic party contained a declara-
tion as follows:

"We denounce the silver bill, so called
(the Sherman) as an ignominious
surrender to the money power. It
perpetuated the demonitizing of silver
and the single gold standard, whereas
the interest of the people require the
complete remonetization of silver and
its restoration to perfect equality with
gold in our coinage. We demand the
free and unrestricted coinage of silver
upon the basis existing prior to 1873." This
is where I stand now and it is
where all democrats stand, and it is no
wonder that the goldbug papers de-
nounce democrats for standing on their
principles and try to coerce them into
leaving the party and joining the "gold
party," the 4th party.

In 1892 the Indiana State platform of
the republican party, declared on the
money question as follows:

"We cordially commend the action of

the republican congress on the subject
of silver coinage." Every democratic
congressman who is recorded as voting,
including the last candidate of that
party for Vice President, at the time of
demonitization of silver, voted in favor
of that measure. Ex President Cleve-
land by message to congress strongly
opposed all legislation favorable to silver
coinage and the law recently enacted
(the Sherman act) was passed in spite
of persistent democratic opposition.
Under its beneficent influence silver
has rapidly appreciated the gold stand-
ard of values. Farm products are ad-
vancing in price, and commerce is feel-
ing the impulse of increased prosperity.
It will add more than \$50,000,000
annually of *sound money currency* to
the amount in circulation among the
people and is a *long and prudent step*
toward free coinage."

Now who is the "silver crank?" When
did silver become *unsound money* under
either democrat or republican prin-
ciples as declared in their platforms?
Never, no never. It is the bolters who
are condemning democrats and republi-
cans as *silver cranks*. It is the 4th
party, Wall Street Goldbug Rothschild
English party. But later still. In 1894
the democrats of Indiana in their State
platform of August 15th, 1894, less than
a year ago said: "We endorse the re-
peal of the purchasing clause of that
cowardly republican makeshift, the
Sherman silver act of 1890. We re-
affirm our belief that both gold and
silver should be used as the money
standard of the country, and that both
should be coined without discriminat-
ing against either metal and without
charge for mintage. We believe it
absolutely necessary to the welfare and
prosperity of the great producing
masses that silver should be restored to
the place it occupied in the coinage
system of the world a quarter of a
century ago." A quarter of a century
ago would reach back to 1870, prior to
the demonitization of silver in 1873. I
stand on this platform now, and I think
all other true democrats do. All who
now advocate the single gold standard
have certainly bolted the party that
adopted these platforms, but accuse
those who still stand by them as being
bolters. But later still. In June, 1895,
the republican clubs of the United
States met at Cleveland, Ohio, with
over one thousand delegates present,
and that august republican body passed
a resolution endorsing and adopting the
Minneapolis platform of the national
republican party in 1892, above set out
as follows:

"The American people from tradition
and interest favor bimetalism and the
republican party demands the use of
both gold and silver as standard money."
Now in all fairness, who has bolted
the party? Nobody but the single
standard gold advocates like Bynum,
Carlisle, Cleveland, Sherman, and the
papers who justify them. The people
of this country have been taught free
coinage of silver and bimetalism by all
parties and all newspapers until a few
of them have joined the gold forces,
whose only object is to increase the
value of gold and decrease the value of
labor and the products of labor, and to
pauperize the people just as the single
gold standard has done in England,
Scotland, Ireland and other gold stand-
ard countries, and if the gold policy is
continued here it will inevitably reduce
our laboring and producing classes to
the same level of Scotland, Ireland and
England. Do you want that? If you
do join the gold party at once. If you
do not want it stand by American prin-
ciples, the American financial policy,
the gold and silver policy established by
our forefathers in our constitution.

city and town in the State, and the out-
come will be watched with interest.

The selection of George Brewer for
county superintendent by the republi-
can trustees last week, has left a breach
in the republican ranks that will be hard
to reconcile. The defeated candidates
are crying fraud and are open in their
threats to bring dire destruction to
what they style the "ring" that engin-
eered the deal through.

The Illinois republican boodle legis-
lature has adjourned. It was the most
corrupt body in the history of that
State, and will go far toward again
placing that State in the democratic
column in 1896.

The Good Citizens League should
turn its attention to the present city
council. If there is any clause in the
League's constitution which provides
for the inspection and riddance of a cor-
rupt city government it certainly has
ample food for thought and ground for
work. As between keeping a peanut
stand closed on Sunday and regulating
city affairs which involves thousands
and thousands of dollars it doesn't re-
quire much of a brain to see which is
paramount. The one is only baby
play compared with the other. If the
Good Citizens League years to ingra-
tiate itself with the good people of the
city by accomplishing something that
will echo down the corridors of time let
it array itself with the democratic party
at the next city election, and assist in
exterminating a pest that has for years
held the municipal reigns and eaten
pap from the public trough. The con-
tinuous reign of any one party always
grows corrupt. Those cities enjoying
the greatest prosperity are where politi-
cal parties are evenly matched or where
politics cut no figure and men are cho-
sen from their fitness for the position.
Is this our case, and is it any wonder
we are corrupt. The Good Citizens
League should paste this in their hats.

So much partiality is shown in the

ing classes of the city by the common
council and its hirelings that even May-
or Bander revolts. A great many men
who are forced to idleness by the scar-
city of labor have made application
for sufficient work to pay the taxes
on their little homes, but the appeals
have so far been to deaf ears and the
dishing out of work to a select few goes
right on with disgusting regularity.
When such politicians as Mayor Bander
openly censure the council for adopt-
ing such nefarious methods it must be
indeed rotten to the core.
