**TOO MUCH "COMPREHENSIVE
SYSTEM."**

The council came near ordering
another addition to our patch-work
of sewers last Monday night, but no move
was made toward a comprehensive sys-
tem. Journal.

The tax-payers of this city have seen
too much of this "comprehensive sys-
tem" of this republican city council.
They have seen within the past few
years the taxes raised from 50 cents to
\$1.00 on the \$100 valuation through
this republican "comprehensive system."
They have seen the construction of an
electric light system, which originally
was to cost \$35,000, run up to \$80,000
and piled a large debt on the people
which it will require years of time to
extinguish through this "comprehensive
system." They have seen them buy an
expensive street grader for \$3,800, which
if sold to an individual would have cost
but a little more than half that sum of
money, and all through the "compre-
hensive system" of management of this
present republican city government.
The people, the majority of them at
least, want no sewer system on a "com-
prehensive" or any other plan. The
demand for it comes alone from those
who expect to be benefitted by it pecu-
niarily. Not over one voter in five
would favor it under existing circum-
stances. The men who would have to
pay for it are not demanding it at all.
They prefer to draw a few breaths of
rest before being forced into any new
"comprehensive systems."

SHANKLIN.

Shanklin, of the Evansville Courier, it
is stated, will be out for the democratic
nomination for Governor. This indi-
vidual seems to have filled entirely too
much newspaper space for the amount
of his ability or usefulness to the party.
He foolishly imagined himself a party
leader, and at the first dash made an
attack on Gov. Gray at the opening of
the campaign of 1892, but Gray knew
more about politics than Shanklin ever
dreamed, and in a little quiet work he
fell quick, and ceased at once to be a
candidate for Governor. Since that
time he seems to have been posing as a
Cincinnatian of old, waiting for the Presi-
dent to call him to take charge of some
good fat office, but the President has
not called yet, nor is he likely to, on
Shanklin. The most sensible thing it
would seem for this man to do would be
to drop the office seeking feature of
politics, and attend strictly to his
"knitting" on other lines.

The Iron Age, in its last issue, says:
"Those who habitually hunt for clouds
on the horizon must go outside of the
iron trade now"—a remark which, but
for the ever present army of croakers,
would be superfluous. The prosperity
of our iron and steel industries has been
strikingly exhibited of late in the in-
crease of wages voluntarily ordered by
iron and steel mills. The latest increase
has been reported from Rhode Island.
The Woonsocket Machine and Press
company has restored wages to the
rates which obtained before the cut in
1893. The fact is that many of the iron
and steel factories of the United States
are now pressed with work to fill orders
and whenever this is the case labor
must be well employed and well remun-
erated."

A REPUBLICAN REFORM.

The new republican management of
the northern penitentiary has already
made several changes which are of in-
creased expense to the tax-payers. The
labor of two or three hundred convicts
has been awarded to contractors at
rates below 40 cents per day, whereas
heretofore it was above that figure.
The State has also to pay for new ma-
chinery for contractors which it did not
do before. This penitentiary business
was one of the "reforms" that the re-
publicans expected to bring about when
they attained power. The fewer "re-
forms" of that kind the tax-payers of
the State may have the better.

SOMEHOW or other in awarding con-
tracts for city work, Foster & Co., a
foreign firm who pay no taxes here,
always receive the work. Can some of
the members of our good republican
city council explain how this is? If
any of them are candidates for the
council next year, it may be well to get
their explanations in good shape by
that time.

THE bituminous coal miners in the
region of Brazil and in Clay county
have, after some weeks of contention,
finally won in their strike and are to
receive 60 cents per ton for their work.
Now if they will subside for the next
twelve months the public at large will
be satisfied fully as much as they are
now.

MUST MUZZLE NICHOLSON.

The Lafayette Courier is in favor of
putting a muzzle on reformer Nicholson.
It thinks the larger cities of the State
will hold the Republican party respon-
sible for Nicholson's utterances which
will have a tendency to down that party
in 1896. It says that "intemperate agi-
tation is having the effect of weakening
the forces of the party to such an extent
that the solid ground on which it was
confident of having placed itself last
November is fast slipping away like the
sands on the seashore. Mr. Nicholson
is too conspicuous. His evident desire
to make a profession of his accidental
notoriety is repugnant. If he has any
serious concern for the republican party
or the cause of temperance, the best that
he can do is to retire from the public
gaze and help to put a quietus on sense-
less agitation than can but result in ulti-
mate harm to all worthy interests con-
cerned. He and other equally intemperate
temperance zealots have insisted that
the republican party in Indiana
should commit deliberate suicide. It
has partially succeeded in so doing, and
will do so most effectually unless there is
a change of tactics."

A SOUND ASSERTION.

Among the first resolutions adopted
by the Ohio State Democratic Conven-
tion in session last week at Springfield
we note the following: "The demo-
cratic party of Ohio in convention
assembled points with satisfaction and
pride to the wisdom of the action of
that party in the last two years and the
results accomplished according to its
promises, to wit: The repeal of the re-
publican legislation known as the Sher-
man law, the un-American federal elec-
tion law and the McKinley law, from
which repeals has resulted returning
prosperity to the country to such an
extent that even the republicans are
obliged to recognize the same." In
condemning the democratic party for
the late panic and "hard times" follow-
ing, the inconsiderate fail too often in
attributing the true cause for it. They
fail to note that in the beginning of this
administration it had an empty treasury
on its hands, and that many useless and
nonsensical laws were in operation, the
work of former republican Congresses
that were injurious to the prosperity of
the country.

A RECENT interview with William C.
Whitney shows that he regards the de-
mocratic party at this time as remarkably
strong. He said:

"I think the condition of the Demo-
cratic party in the whole country to-day
is remarkably strong, even stronger than
it has been since the war." "Why?"

"Because for the first time since the war
it has a record to stand on. It has done
something. In spite of an extremely
high tariff public revenues were falling
off and the republican party had proved
itself entirely irresponsible by its ex-
travagance. The so-called prosperity of
the country was fostered by a tariff
which granted enormous profits in spots
and at the same time stifled general com-
petition and depressed individual enter-
prise. A crash was inevitable. The
Cleveland administration met the crisis
which the republicans had evaded. The
republicans created the difficulties and
the Cleveland administration solved them."

The odious and self conceived organi-
zation, the A. P. A., which occasionally
tries to stir up something in politics,
but generally fizzles, it is said will try
to turn the tide in Indianapolis election
affairs in October next by opposing Tom
Taggart, who will be the democratic
candidate for Mayor. How different
the sentiment pervading that organiza-
tion to those held by a Catholic speaker
at a summer school in New York in
which he said: "She loves every star
and stripe in the flag of freedom, and in
its defense she is ready at any time to
send forth her sons to do battle with
any nation, any rulers, any people. She
is ready to sell her lands and her
churches to keep that flag waving.
This is what the Catholic church
believes and teaches concerning the
American republic, and this is her
motto: For God and country; for God
honor and glory; for country, peace and
prosperity."

DURING twenty-four years of repub-
lican ascendancy the average reduction
of the public debt was \$79,000,000 a
year. Journal.

Why direct the peoples' attention to
such big things as government finan-
ciering when we can see specimens
much worse right at home? During
the past six years of republican finan-
ciering in Crawfordsville city govern-
ment, our city debt increased from a few
thousand dollars to over \$80,000, and
city taxes which were then below 90
cents are now \$1 on the \$100 valuation.
Give the people object lessons on finance
at home first.

CAMPBELL FOR GOVERNOR.

The democracy of Ohio in State con-
vention assembled at Springfield, last
week nominated Hon. J. E. Campbell
for Governor. Campbell was elected
Governor of that State six years ago
under unexpected circumstances and
amid many political difficulties. In
accepting the nomination with a major-
ity last year in favor of the opposition,
he indicates that he is composed of the
true metal and is inspired by a spirit
that will allow no discouraging circum-
stances to come in his way in the effort
to attain victory.

QUAY AND PENNSYLVANIA.

Quay, the Pennsylvania machine poli-
tician, has again triumphed over his
political enemies in that State, and has
the control and dictation of his party
for some time to come. He is a repub-
lican, but at the same time has an
unusual number of foes within the
ranks of his own party, yet they have
been unable to overthrow him. In that
State the masses of voters come nearer
being voting serfs than in any other. In
fact they seem compelled to vote just as
they are told. It would be greatly to
the benefit of the people if they would
overthrow such bosses as Quay, Cam-
eron and others, who for a long time
have held them in a vice-like grip.
They might learn what they are paying
taxes for, how they are applied and
many other interesting matters. Badly
is a State cursed that is under control
of bosses, and Pennsylvania seems
doubly afflicted in that line.

The talk of removing the national
capital from Washington City to a point
west of the Mississippi has been again
revived. It would seem that the capital
of any empire, republic or state, should
be near its center. Washington City is
entirely too far to one side. Why not
locate it either in Missouri or Kansas?
But wouldn't the owners of real estate
in Washington City howl if such a
thing were ever done.
