BIG DAY IN LADOGA.

The Corn Carnival, Bicycle Races, Baby Show and Balloon Ascension.

Ladoga celebrated her corn carnival on last Saturday. All the stores and streets in the main part of town were decorated with corn and presented a fine appearance. Early in the morning people began to throng the streets and by ten o'clock the crowd was estimated at about 3,000. The first event to come off was the corn exhibit and the prizes were awarded. The bicycle races then followed, ending the program for the morning.

The first event in the afternoon was the baby show at the opera house. The stage was also finely decorated. About thirty babies accompanied by their mothers, occupied the stage. There were many different kinds of babies, the large baby, the fat baby and the little tiny baby. They were judged by three ladies who understood what a baby should be. There were several kicks by the mothers of the babies, because they thought their baby was the prettiest and the best and should be given a prize. The Ladoga band then gave a concert which was about as good as the Crawfordsville band, and who everybody knows is very rank. It sounded like a couple of Scotchmen playing on bag pipes.

Promptly at 4 o'clock the big balloon was inflated with hot air and was ready to soar high in the heavens. The ascension was a very good one, being in the air about ten minutes before the parachute leap was made. The man landed in a field about three miles from the starting point in perfect safety.

Chas. Goodbar, of the New York store, stated that it was the biggest day they had ever had, and also many other business men said the same thing.

Ladoga is one of the best towns in the State for the size. The merchants always work together and no jealousy exists between them. Every time they undertake anything it is always a success. All business houses are kept open in the evenings and consequently it draws the farmers to that place instead of them coming to this city. A leading business man stated that it was the worst thing Crawfordsville could do, and that it had killed the town. A similar exhibition could be given by the merchants of this city at a very little expense.

Thirteen Cents on the Dollar.
Last April Aaron Mossler, of Thorn-ton, a dry goods and clothing dealer, made an assignment. The final report of H. C. Ulen, trustee, has just been filed. The unsecured creditors receive very little. The available assets were \$11,207.51. The preferred claims of Lew Mossler, son of the assignor, amount to \$2,300; of Joseph Franklin, son-in-law, \$901; of Bettman Brothers, of Cincinnati, \$1,000; taxes \$300. The assignee charges \$1,000, while his attorneys ask for \$500. The unpreferred creditors have claims pending for \$12,137.61, with but \$1,765.02 with which to pay it, making about 13 cents on the dollar. Indianapolis wholesale men are among the unpreferred creditors. This Mossler, we believe, is a brother of the individual who opened a clothing store here with a great flourish of trumpets, potted plants and music some three years ago in the Citizens' National Bank room, but after a few months fizzled out and moved away. The Thornton man is not the first one of the name that has "burst." The trustee in this assignment seems to have made a good thing of it in receiving \$1,000 for six months' service.

The Notorious "Bull Dog" in Jail Again.
Albert Young, better known as "Bull Dog," in company with his bosom friend Willie Jarrett, were arrested by the police Sunday night. "Bull Dog" is

wanted here for robbing a man about two months ago. He is wanted also in several places for similar offenses. After robbing the man here he went to Thorntown and Lebanon and had some trouble but escaped without being arrested. Jarrett claims to be from Jacksonville, but the police think he is wanted in several other places. They are both tough customers, and "Bull Dog" especially should never be allowed to be out of the penitentiary.

George Robinson is given the G. B.

George Robinson, the oldest in service of any employee of the Big Four in this county, was retired from his duties as agent of the company yesterday and a new man, W. S. Lucas, of Muncie, Ind., appointed to the position. The cause of the removal is unknown. Railway officials rarely furnish such information to the public, considering no doubt, that it is none of their business. There were rumors that he had been reported as lazy and inattentive to many of the duties imposed on him, but the public here will not believe it as Mr. Robinson has always been considered as an accommodating agent. He has been in the employ of the line ever since its construction through here, as operator and agent.

The Monon to Be Stone Ballasted.

A dispatch from Salem says: Yesterday the great stone-crushing works of the L. N. A. & Chicago railroad were put in operation with forty men.

A crew is kept here, and one train of twenty cars of crushed stone was sent to New Albany and distributed along the track from that city north.

The whole line from New Albany to Chicago will be stone ballasted as fast as the work can be done, and all the stone will

be crushed at the mills here where the company own a considerable tract of stone land adjacent to their yards.

It is said that they also have a contract for 10,000 car loads of crushed stone for the streets of Chicago. The mill has a capacity of sixty to seventy five car loads per day, but only forty car loads per day are contemplated at present.

New Monon Depot.

At last after many long years of delay the Monon has determined to give this station a new depot, the materials to go

into its construction being placed now on the ground and workmen having already begun the work. The only objection on the part of the public is the location. That part of the town immediately in the vicinity of the depot being considered very tough, and a

sojourn after night waiting for trains being very undesirable. The depot will

have two waiting rooms, a ticket office and in front a good wide platform. The

building will be ready for occupancy within two months.

filed a suit against the Indianapolis and Terre Haute Railroad for damages to the amount of \$50,000. Mrs. Wallace

was a passenger on the Vandalia train that was wrecked near Coatesville on the 23rd of last January. Three people

were killed. Mrs. Wallace avers that she has suffered concussion of the spine, will never be able to recover the use of her body, and that she will have to give up her vocation, that of an opera singer, which was worth \$10,000 a year.

A correspondent of the Indianapolis News thus relates the particulars of the Clara Shanks funeral which occurred last Sunday: "One of the largest funerals ever taking place in this section of the State occurred Sunday at the Friends Union church, near the Grange Corner crossroads, in Parke county. The funeral was that of Miss Clara Shanks, the young girl who was murdered last summer and whose body was thrown in the pool below Wolfe Creek Falls. The funeral had been extensively advertised for several weeks, and everyone turned out for many miles around. The community is a wild and distinctly primitive one, and the people attending the exercises were perfectly characteristic of their environments. Several thousand were in attendance, and the hucksters did a land office business the entire day. Many picnicked in the woods and the affair was in many respects in the nature of an old settlers' gathering. The services at the church were conducted by Elder Joe Skeeters, of Edgar, Ill., and Elder Cornelius Airhart, of Advance, this State, two Predestinarian Baptist divines, and their efforts, after the manner of the old school, were eminent.
