**THE DISORGANIZERS.**

Bynum, Wilson and other democrats  
about Indianapolis, who are organizing  
the bolt so far as this State is concerned  
against the regular nominees for  
president and vice president of the  
democracy of the nation, are simply  
digging their own political graves.  
What efforts they make toward dis-  
rupting and disorganizing the party  
through nominating another ticket  
against Bryan and Sewell, will in the  
next political fight hereafter rise up in  
judgment against them. The democra-  
cy can have hereafter no further use for  
them and, unless they join the ranks of  
the opposition, should retire permanent-

**TAXING INCOMES.**

Hon. W. J. Bryan, in his address ac-  
cepting the nomination for president on

of men millionaires in this country who
