HANNA'S CAMPAIGN FUND.

The worst element in this campaign is
the part which Mark Hanna's fund is
playing. Caudor compels me to give
the facts without regard to whether Mr.
Bryan's election would be a good thing
or a bad thing. There is plenty of evi-
dence, in my opinion, to show that this
is rapidly becoming the most corrupt
and corrupting political struggle known
to the American people.

Bryan may be defeated, but the in-
fluence of money and of Mark Hanna's
methods upon the voters of Wisconsin,
in common with the voters of other
states, will not disappear after election
day.

Let me give one example. I speak of
a matter I know and understand. The
Reliance machine works, owned by the
Edward P. Allis company, are situated
in Milwaukee. There are employed in
this establishment something like 1,800
men. Here the Bryan sentiment is very
strong.

It is an absolute fact that eighteen
working men in this establishment are
at this moment on the pay-roll of the
republican state committee as secret
political agitators. Their companions
are ignorant of this fact and do not sus-
pect it.

The result is that these men have an
influence which they could not possibly
wield were the truth known.

The republican committee has also, I
am informed, upon its pay-rolls a large
number of men in another establish-
ment, which employs about 2,000 work-
ingmen. In several of the factories
here gold standard arguments are
pinned each week to the envelopes con-
taining wages.

The republican committee has also
sent men into the mining districts of
Wisconsin to offer \$5 in Mexican silver
for \$2.75 in American money. Mil-
waukee special to N. Y. World (gold bug).

The corruption fund raised by the
national republican campaign managers
is larger this year than ever known.
Hanna understands thoroughly the art
of squeezing the wealthy corporations
and syndicates in the interest of the
party, and this year has got in his work
in good style.

THE GOVERNOR'S ASPIRATIONS.

We greatly fear that there is one man
who will come out of this campaign
with feathers greatly ruffled, and that is
Gov. Matthews. He desires, it is con-
stantly asserted, the position of U. S.
Senator in the event of the majority of
the State legislature being democratic
this winter. He, however, is not, we
believe, adding to his laurels judged by
reports, by his attempted manipulations
of political affairs. He antagonized
Chairman Holt of the State central
committee, by refusing to confirm the
appointment of McCullough as an elec-
tion commissioner, the matter finally re-
sulting in the resignation of Holt. In
this district, it is well understood, that
the nomination of Cheadle, not a demo-
crat, was brought around by Judge Mc-
Cabe, Capt. Allen and one or two
others, guided by the advice, suggestion
and aid of Gov. Matthews, who desired
the populist influence wherever and
whenever convenient in his desire to be
Senator. It may be that there was
much more of this work in other dis-
tricts of the State. Our opinion that
Gov. Matthews departing from the
usual discrete and level headed course
that has distinguished him, has already
raised combative forces sufficiently
powerful to crush out his future polit-
ical aspirations for some years to come.

HOLT'S RESIGNATION.

Chairman Holt, of the democratic
State central committee, resigned last
week and Parks M. Martin, of Owen
county, appointed to the position. The
resignation at this time in the midst of
the campaign is to be regretted, and
plainly stated cannot but be demoraliz-
ing more or less for a time to the party's
interests. Holt was distinctively a gold
bug, and opposed the Chicago nomina-
tions and was not in sympathy with a
majority of the party on the free silver
question. The ability or political tact
of Mr. Martin is now to be shown and
it is hoped that it will be displayed by
the exercise of such work as may great-
ly aid in the party's triumph in Novem-
ber.

The gold bug fellows tell you that if
you have bimetalism you will drive all
the gold from the country. Well, facts
are better any time than theory. France
is on a bimetallic basis and she has
more gold than any other country in
the world. The supply of gold is more
than \$800,000,000. She has \$200,000,000
more gold than single gold standard
Germany, nearly \$300,000,000 more than
gold standard England. Take even
Russia an absolute single silver stand-
ard country and she has close to \$500,-
000,000 in gold. Now with these facts
and figures before them can any single
gold standard man have the hardihood
to stand up and say that bimetalism
will drive the gold from the country?

Suppose the gold parties succeed in
compelling the people this year to vote
according to their dictation and thus
elect McKinley and establish the gold
standard on a permanent basis in this
country, what is to become of the farm-
er and wage-earner? Before another
election comes he will be in such a con-
dition that he will be completely at the
mercy of the gold power. The Aus-
trian ballot law will probably be repealed
and his only safeguard thus taken from
him. Now is the time to prevent the
calamity. Let the people vote now to
secure their rights under the law.

HON. WM. J. BRYAN is continuing his
cavasses, and this week spoke in Ken-
tucky and North Carolina. Next week
he is in Baltimore and on east through
New Jersey into Maine. He will speak
in this State at Indianapolis next
month.


