HANNA'S CAMPAIGN FUND.

The worst element in this campaign is

the part which Marie Hanna's fund is

playing. Candor compels me to give

the facts without regard to whether Mr.

Bryan's election would be a good thing

or a bad thing. There is plenty of evi-

dence, in my opinion, to show that this

is rapidly becoming the most corrupt

and corrupting political struggle known

to the American people.

Bryan may be defeated, but the in-

fluence of money and of Mark Hanna's

methods upon the voters of Wisconsin,

in common with the voters of other

states, will not disappear after election

day.

Let me give one example. I speak of

a matter I know and understand. The

Reliance machine works, owned by the

Edward P. Allis company, are situated

in Milwaukee. There are employed in

this establishment something like 1,800

men. Here the Bryan sentiment is

very strong.

It is an absolute fact that eighteen

working men in this establishment are

at this moment on the pay-roll of the

republican state committee as secret

political agitators. Their compa-

nions are ignorant of this fact and do not sus-

pect it.

The result is that these men have an

influence which they could not possibly

wield were the truth known.

The republican committee has also, I

am informed, upon its pay-roll a large

number of men in another establish-

ment, which employs about 2,000 work-

ingmen. In several of the factories here gold standard arguments are

pinned each week to the envelopes con-

taining wages.

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THE GOVERNOR'S ASPIRATIONS.

We greatly fear that there is one man who will come out of this campaign with feathers greatly ruffled, and that is Gov. Matthews. He desires, it is constantly asserted, the position of U. S. Senator in the event of the majority of the State legislature being democratic this winter. He, however, is not, we believe, adding to his laurels judged by reports, by his attempted manipulations of political affairs. He antagonized Chairman Holt of the State central committee, by refusing to confirm the appointment of McCullough as an election commissioner, the matter finally resulting in the resignation of Holt. In this district, it is well understood, that the nomination of Cheadle, not a democrat, was brought around by Judge McCafe, Capt. Allen and one or two others, guided by the advice, suggestion and aid of Gov. Matthews, who desired the populist influence wherever and whenever convenient in his desire to be Senator. It may be that there was much more of this work in other districts of the State. Our opinion that Gov. Matthews departing from the usual discrete and level headed course that has distinguished him, has already raised combative forces sufficiently powerful to crush out his future political aspirations for some years to come.

HOLT'S RESIGNATION.

Chairman Holt, of the democratic State central committee, resigned last week and Parks M. Martin, of Owen county, appointed to the position. The resignation at this time in the midst of the campaign is to be regretted, and plainly stated cannot but be demoralizing more or less for a time to the party's interests. Holt was distinctively a gold bug, and opposed the Chicago nominations and was not in sympathy with a majority of the party on the free silver question. The ability or political tact of Mr. Martin is now to be shown and it is hoped that it will be displayed by the exercise of such wits as may greatly aid in the party's triumph in November.
