The Republican Rally.

In numbers in line the republican rally of Saturday last was the largest seen here in several years. The procession was something over an hour in passing, and judged by the average calculation of time horses spend in walking in a straight line, may have been six miles in length. Old residents say the processions of both parties here in the campaign of 1884 were larger. Everything we are pleased to note, passed off pleasantly, there being few or no fights or rows, nor pin-headed students to bother the speakers or create disturbances. Some of the wagons were very neatly decorated, some of the mottoes or banner inscriptions very nonsensical. At every meeting the republicans had had for three weeks previous the party leaders had urged their followers to turn out to the rally at Crawfordsville on the 17th. From the counties of Parke, Fountain and Tippecanoe delegations came to swell the crowd, and of course this added to the home delegations, made a big attendance of people. Collum, of Illinois, and Beveridge, of Indianapolis, addressed the crowds, the former at the fair ground. By four o'clock the people began rapidly to disperse for their homes, and soon all signs of a rally had faded.

NOTES OF THE RALLY.

The best dressed people in any of the delegations were undoubtedly those from the vicinity of Wingate. The dresses and caps worn by the female portion from there were neat, tidy and appropriate.

With his hands tightly gripped on the lines, sitting erect as a statue, four prancing black horses in front of him, would Jim Inley have swapped places with the Governor? Doubtful.

There were eight or nine bands of music in the procession, and most of the music played was very "rocky," the exception being that of Waynetown, which has some good players, and if keeping together, will in time develop into a fine musical organization. As aside music as any is that of the Crawfordville band, all there is to commend it is its clothing.

One of the mottoes said "Bryan is composed of Salt and Wat r." McKinley has other ingredients in his composition, no doubt, which it would be impolite to mention.

It is very questionable if big rallies count for anything in the final result to any party considering the money expended and time employed. Does it make a vote for either party? Doubtful.

Seen by another workman he at once reduced the price to 90 cents. Others seeing the reduction followed suit until the price went down to 50 cents. They will get tired of that kind of competition soon.
