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## GEN. WALLACE

Gives Some Political Reminiscences of Himself to a Crowd of Listeners.

Talking to a crowd of politicians at Indianapolis the other day in speaking of a portion of his own political career Gen. Wallace said:

"My appointment as Minister to Turkey," said Gen. Wallace "came about in this way: I was surprised to receive one day a telegram from President Garfield, asking me to come to Washington at once I did so. Arriving at the White House I called upon General Garfield. (We became well acquainted at the battle of Shiloh.)

### HE SAID TO ME:

"General, I want you to go as the representative of the Government to Uruguay and Paraguay."

"I told President Garfield that I did not care to go to those South American States, and kindly declined."

"Well," said the President, "I have just been reading 'Ben-Hur' and if you won't go to South America I want you to go to Turkey and write another book, using the material that can be furnished by the annals of the great East."

"I immediately told him I would not only accept the position, but I would write the book. He put his arms about my shoulders as we separated, and shortly after that I took a steamer for Turkey. When we were off the coast of Ireland the first news I received from this country was the announcement of President Garfield's assassination. I wrote 'The Prince of India,' and during the entire time I was gathering materials for it I had that last conversation with the promise to President Garfield in my mind."

### WAS A DEMOCRAT.

"The fellow who was accusing me of having already been sufficiently honored," continued the General, "neglected his most important point. He says that I was first given a seat in the Indiana Legislature, but he failed to recall the fact that I sat in the Legislature as a Democrat—yes, and a good Democrat, too. There were none better than I at that time. I served two terms as Senator as a Democrat, and also served two terms as Prosecuting Attorney in my judicial district as a Democrat.

"This was before the war. I got a taste of soldiering in the Mexican War, and when General Taylor was running for President I could not support him, on account of his reflections upon the Second Indiana Regiment at the Battle of Buena Vista."

### THE LUCKY "SEVEN."

Not so Lucky under all Circumstances—The county Bastile at Present.

Through the courtesy of Turnkey Howard Dickerson, a REVIEW reporter was shown through the county jail on Monday and was treated to something of a surprise upon discovering the present population of the iron wards. It is repeating an old story to say that the interior conditions of the jail are next to perfect as to cleanliness and other regularities required at such institutions but it is not repeating an old story when we note the present excess in supply over the demand. But seven wild and wolly prisoners make life merry there, among them one woman, five drunks, and Simpson, the livery thief. These residents of our city, retained by common invitation were not interviewed from the fact that they were all occupied at cards, save Simpson who was busily engaged in perusing a newspaper handed him. The women's department on the second floor was indeed desolate with but one prisoner whose misfortune it was to keep company with solitude and silence. The number of prisoners is exceedingly low, especially when one considers the number of unemployed, the scarcity of business and money and that which follows the temptation to commit crime. Sheriff Davis has kept up the good conditions of the jail for nearly four years in a most commendable manner and much credit is due his turnkey and assistant, Howard Dickerson, who has been Mr. Davis' most active helper since the day he took charge of the office which was three years the 22nd of last August.

### Official Offerings.

Gov. Mount is credited with saying that in the offices of township trustee, road supervisor and county school superintendent there is much stealing and corruption, and he would in his position favor anything that might be proposed to stop this wrong. Of course it is not meant that all trustees, all road supervisors and all school superintendents are corrupt and dishonest, but that the way the offices are managed it gives fine opportunities for those thus inclined to be dishonest and filch money from the county treasurers, under various heads that should be prevented by the enactment of more rigid laws governing these positions. Many men occupying these places in the past have been known to have acted dishonestly, to have wronged the tax payers, and disgraced themselves. Laws to reduce this corrupt work to a considerable extent could be enacted. If this present legislature will enact such all the better for the public.

## UNFORTUNATE GEORGE.

Has His Goods Thrown Out of His Home by the Constable at Romney, and is Compelled to Hunt Another Abiding Place.

Many persons here know George W. Voris, as he formerly lived in the country and has many relatives living here. His actions regarding himself and toward other persons here became notorious. He is of an erratic, stubborn disposition, and it would seem can get along with no body any length of time. George was a gallant soldier during the war and is entitled to a pension, and should have it, but his obstinate disposition in refusing to submit to a medical examination as all veterans are compelled to, has kept him from getting it and probably always will, and he is very likely to go down to his grave depriving his children and family of that much at least, whatever it might be, of money which would benefit them. A special examiner was here once who came on purpose to make the examination, but George, as heretofore, refused to submit, and is still without any pay from the government. Through his obstinacy he has become hard up, is without much means, and has been forced out of his home for rent by officers. The following from the Lafayette Journal is the latest concerning him:

### An Important Decision.

Attorney General Ketcham has rendered an opinion that it is a violation of the insurance law for a company to insert the following in its policies:

"It is a part of the consideration of this policy and the basis upon which the rate of premium is fixed that in the event of loss the company shall not be liable for any amount greater than three-fourths of the actual cash value of the property covered by the policy at the time of such loss and in case of other insurance whether policies are concurrent or not, then for only its pro-rata proportion of such three-fourths value."

This is the clause which has so often defrauded policy holders out of their rights.

### The Correct Position.

In mentioning a squabble among the township trustee some twelve years ago over the election of a county superintendent an error in the statement regarding the position occupied by trustees Ford and Morgan was made in our last issue. Cantley was a democrat seeking a re-election, while Fry was a republican. Ford, the democratic trustee, would not under any circumstances support Cantley, but was willing to favor any other democrat seeking the place, while Morgan would not support any other man but Cantley. The disagreement over Cantley led to his defeat and the selection of Fry. This, we believe, is the correct position of both men in the contest.

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### Popular Perry.

Rev. Perry T. Martin of Williamsport has been employed as pastor of the Christian church at Brazil, at a salary of \$1,000 per year. Rev. Martin is a very eloquent divine and has a great many friends at Williamsport who are loth to see him take his departure.—Covington Republican.
