THE LAST OF FUSION.

Indications are quite plain that the
fusion business in politics has had its
day. Those most favorable to it at the
beginning of the campaign were at its
close disgusted thoroughly at the re-
sults. The democracy very generally
in these deals received the hot end of
the poker, so to speak. The mountain
of Populism was on development only a
small mouse, but a very irritating one.
In very few States of the Union did it
exert much influence or power. Its lead-
ers were exacting to the last inch, and
when ever possible exercised a threaten-
ing and a domineering spirit. By the
democracy yielding to them it was much
injured in self respect and humili-
ated to the last degree. The truth is
Populism only in a few certain local-
ities had any fixed strength, and never
again will it exert the power it did in
the past. At Chicago last year at the
national convention thousands of dem-
ocrats were irritated at the excessive
demands of this short lived organiza-
tion. At this congressional district
convention at Frankfort democratic
delegates yielded to the fusion demands
and threw aside time tried party lead-
ers and selected a populist demand for
the nomination. And we know the re-
sult too. And in the election the other
day in the State legislature when it came
to the selection of a U. S. Senator, G. H.
of Ladoga, a populist and elected last
fall by democratic votes, had not the
populists nor decency to cast his vote
for Voorhees, a democrat, but voted
for Templeton, a populist. It may be
some compensation, however, to know
that among the seven or eight long
bearded and uncombed members of his
party in the legislature he was the
only one to be silly enough to thus act.
An act is now before the legislature to
amend the election law so that any can-
didate name can appear but on one
ticket. If passed it will tend very
greatly to do away with the fusion
business. Democrats will always main-
tain greater strength in the party, and
win more friends by avoiding hereafter
such nonsensical collisions with any
political organization regardless of what
name it may be daubed in the political
field. If we have principles let us up-
hold them at all times regardless of any
pop-in-jay organization that they may
not suit. Our ranks are open to re-
cruits, at all times, but principles must
be maintained at all times if we are to
succeed. Fusion will be a very unpop-
ular feature hereafter, we believe, judg-
ing from expressions heard.

THE "COMPLIMENT" BUSINESS.

In casting the vote for U. S. Senator
in the State legislature the other day
the republicans through their majority,
elected Fairbanks. The democrats
with no prospects of electing anybody
cast their votes for Hon. D. W. Voor-
hees. This was done as a compliment
to him only, and is one of those political
traditional humbugs that is almost al-
ways given when the individual has no
chance whatever for an election. They
must vote for somebody to exhibit their
principles and belief and it matters little
who it is under such situation. Sup-
pose the majority in the present legis-
lature had been democratic. Where
then would have been Voorhees? Many
of those urging the complimentary vote
for him the other day would have been
among the first to knife him. There
are a half dozen men of the party an-
xious to fill his shoes, and had there have
been any prospect there would have
been few complimentary votes for Voor-
hees. It simply shows how lavish some
men are with votes which will do them
no harm and the recipient no good.
Senator Voorhees' work is about fin-
ished. For near 50 years he has been a
prominent figure in the political world.
While a man of many mistakes his
heart has been right. He has stood
faithfully by his party in sunshine and
storm, and these complimentary votes
at the end of his political career will
not effect him or his standing with the
party that he has served so long and
well.

The legislature gives forth no prom-
ise yet of making any appropriation for
the proposed "Indiana Centennial Cele-
bration" in 1900, and representing the
views of nine tenths of the tax-payers
will not. Those anxious individuals,
mostly residents of the State capital, it
would seem, will be compelled to wait
until a more fitting season to inaugu-
rate their raids on the State treasury,
as indications certainly point that the
people are not of a disposition to allow
them now.

TAXATION FOR THE POOR.

Since the council has determined to
add to the burdens of the tax-payers
by taxing them for sewer system under
the guise of giving employment to poor
men this winter the question arises why
cannot this same thing be done for
other improvements and for other win-
ter seasons that may hereafter follow.
It is setting a dangerous precedent and
will hereafter be attempted when other
councilmen are running the city. The
question is has any corporation the
right to tax citizens for the purpose of
furnishing employment to men? Cer-
tainly not, we believe. No corporation
is compelled to furnish men employ-
ment, or if so for the same reason it can
be forced to give them bread, clothing
and other necessities. Away back be-
hind the assertion that sewers are neces-
sary and that poor men should be fur-
nished work, many believe there is an
other scheme for a few men's especial
benefit. We all remember the rumors
and suspicions regarding the establish-
ment of the electric light plant, and
also the purchase of the "Trilby" road
grader. Whether there were "divys" in
the purchase of these we know not, yet
some men were retired from the city's
management from the belief that there
had been. Time may develop some
strange things regarding the sewerage
business.

DRUGGISTS' LICENSE.

An act asking that it be made a law
compelling druggists to procure license
wherever they retail liquor, is to be in-
troduced before the legislature at its
present session. Druggists are no more
dishonest in pursuing their calling than
any other class of men, yet it has been
known for years in many localities that
a large part of their profits have been
obtained quietly behind prescription
cases or in back rooms dealing out
whisky in small quantities, the same as
the saloon keepers, and often without
authority from any source to do so. The
physician's prescription business has
become a stale humbug and fraud in
many cases. There is entirely too much
whiskey drinking on physicians' pre-
scriptions. The privilege has been
greatly abused. Reputable druggists
do not tolerate it, but all druggists are
not reputable. Some system should
be established, some law enact-
ed to abbreviate at least this abuse.
There are many drunkards graduated
from prescription stands, and are of the
kind would not under any circumstances
be seen entering a saloon. Reputable
druggists should favor some plan to
stop this dram drinking so far as it ef-
fects their business—those in the tra-
de not in this class desire, of course, to
have matters continue as they now are.

DONE NOTHING YET.

The State legislature has been in ses-
sion now over twenty days and has
done little or nothing. No acts have
been handed to the governor for his ap-
proval or veto, and much valuable time
has been already frittered away. The
law making machinery of the State is a
vast expensive traditional humbug.
The good attorneys could in 30 days
agree, pass upon and hand to the gov-
ernor more and better acts for him to pass
upon than the 150 odds, ends and
pickups that are sent by the people
every two years to the State capital to
work for and enact laws for them. Yet
it wouldn't look like popular govern-
ment to a low ten men to make the
laws and in consequence, expensive and
useless as much of it is, it must con-
tinue to be followed.

THE QUAIL HUNTERS LOBBY.

A correspondent from Jamestown of
the Journal referring to the proposed
lobby of the quail hunters from this
place before the legislature says:
"Nine out of ten of these hunters pay
no tax. They keep a few dogs, a gun
and kill all the game that belongs to
the farm. Give us a law that will kill
all the dogs, burst the shot guns, make
the sports ear. Their living like the rest
of us do."
The correspondent speaks some truth
in this. We have frequently observed
that many alleged "sportsmen" are men
of small means and are not among the
first to pay tax at the treasurer's office.

MANY EMPLOYEES.

The two houses of the legislature
have under pay assistants to the num-
ber of 70 or more. It requires now nine
or ten door keepers for each house. All
this is a fair sample of republican econ-
omy. It must be remembered that both
branches of the legislature have a
majority republican and are to a great
extent responsible for any extravagance
shown. It is entirely probable that one-
half this number of employees is ample
for the work to be done, but if so ar-
ranged many political pets would have
to go unrewarded.

NO "FAIRNESS" THERE.

The suggestion that a fair apportion-
ment of the State for Congressional
and Legislative purposes will be made
by the present republican legislature is
a parody on words, a joke upon such an
idea. Men of the Haggard and Hubbell
style of thinking and acting know noth-
ing of fairness in politics and don't
want to learn. There are too many
place hunters in the present general as-
sembly to expect them to act in any
manner fair to political opponents.

TELLER AGAIN SELECTED.

Hon. Henry M. Teller was chosen al-
most unanimously by the Colorado
legislature last week as Senator to suc-
ceed himself for six years dating from
March 4th next. Mr. Teller will
be remembered as the leading speaker
here at the great democratic rally on
the 24th of October last at the Fair
Ground.

It is observed that about all the
names spoken of as probable selections
for McKinley's cabinet are those of
millionaires, or at least wealthy men.
From this it would seem that McKin-
ley thinks that all the brains of the
country belong exclusively to the
well-to-do and they alone are needed to
consult upon national questions coming
up before cabinet meetings.

Judging from the delicacy with
which the members of the legislature
approach the "Vandalia" claim, it looks
much like they have lain themselves
open to the suspicion of having been
"seen" by some persons interested in the
company. The members must do some-
thing soon in the matter if they would
allay any such suspicion.
