THE GOVERNOR AND LYNCH LAW.

Five men were taken from the jail at Versailles, Ind., last week and hung by a mob of 300 men residing in the county. The men hung had been guilty of all sorts of crime in the county for years past and had kept the locality in a state of terror for a long time. Gov. Mount on learning of this was loud in his language denouncing the work of the mob, sent a man down there to investigate all the circumstances, and said the men engaged in this work of lynch law must be brought before the courts of justice and punished; it the whole power of the State had to be brought into operation. This is "all rabbit," as the expression goes. Hovey, Williams, Matthews and all the Governors of the State have said and done about the same thing whenever the work of a mob was made manifest by the hanging of some outlaws. There have been a score or more of lynching affairs in Indiana within as many years and none of the men engaged in them were apprehended, and never will be. A dozen such affairs have happened in two or three counties in Indiana, but nobody was ever punished for it. This little sputtering of Gov. Mount will amount to nothing. He is simply following out the precedents of former Governors. Wouldn't he have a nice time in punishing the 300 men reported to have been engaged in the affair at Versailles last week. The 300 men engaged in the killing of these five men are simply murderers, and deserve a murderer's doom, but it would appear to be an enormous job to arrest, convict and hang the entire crowd. Nothing will come from all this bluster of the Governor, but Ripley county will undoubtedly be a healthier locality to live in than formerly.

COAL OPERATORS.

The coal operators of this country afford a very fitting instance of sowing the wind to reap the whirlwind. The operators and owners of coal mines have for years made it a point to secure the cheapest labor from the lowest foreign element of Europe, to the financial injury of ordinary American laborers. What work an American to live decently would demand \$1.50 per day for the cheap Hungarian or Pole, living like a hog, would do for \$1.00 in the coal mines. It matters not to the coal operator what the effect would be to the general public so he had his work done cheap and enriched himself. But cheap labor is frequently unreliable and is proving so now. The foreigners are often very lawless, create strikes, destroy property, jeopardize human life and make the coal mining business dull, uncertain and unreliable. It is questionable if the business has paid a profit in some years. It has added a very undesirable population to the country, besides a dangerous one. All this comes about from the grasping propensities of mine operators. So long as mines are worked by the class that now delve in them so long will there be strikes, riots and danger to human life. The public is nauseated from year to year with reports of troubles at coal mines. The business needs reorganizing from top to bottom, and the first attempt in that direction should be to pay decent wages and employ native laborers for the work.
