WHAT CLAIM HAS HE?

A correspondent of the Indianapolis News writing from this city and signing himself "Gold Standard" has the following to say of some things political: I, for one, will gladly go to work tomorrow for the success of the ticket, and I believe 99 per cent. of the gold democrats are with me. Let them, however, emphasize the tariff, dodge or temporize with the financial question, assault the merit system, and nominate for Senator a man whose chief qualifications consist of his ability to write fiction and abuse Cleveland, and what can we do but "take to the woods."

The acquaintances of Wallace who have known him and his career for the past forty years will wonder what particular claim or fitness he has for the position of U. S. Senator. Simply being a writer of fiction going around the country and calling Bryan an anarchist does not. A Senator it is supposed should have some elements of a statesman, to know of the political history and present demands of the country, to be free from political bias or prejudice to a reasonable extent, etc. He should know thoroughly constitutional law, and its application to the demands of the country. Simply because he has written "Ben Hur" and gained national notoriety thereby, or been U. S. Minister to Turkey, and become acquainted with numerous cheap politicians, does not fit him at all for the position of U. S. Senator. Taber, of Colorado, and Jones, of Nevada, were Senators, and were daisies too. They hardly knew what they were in the U. S. Senate for. We cannot see where Wallace from Indiana would honor his constituency any better than they did theirs.

THROW THEM OUT.

The Labor Union of this city is an organization of over 400 members. It is created strictly for the interest of aborigines, and a number of republican office seekers, and a few democrats too, have crept into the organization by some hook or crook, to simply further their own selfish interests, and not for one minute that they care a farthing for the condition of laboring men any more than they do for bankers, lawyers, doctors or others not supposed to use their muscles to any great extent. These office seekers are looking solely for votes, and after the nominations and elections are over will be seen no more at the meetings of the organization. Those of the order not looking for office are studying for some plan to throw these men out. They should be encouraged, and show to these demagogues that they have no use for them. Men who seek secret or fraternal organizations solely for office, as many of these men seem to be doing, should be set down upon at once.

OVER \$50,000,000 DEFICIT.

Republican conceit is being thoroughly exposed through the operations of the Dingley tariff law. Time and again have the orators of the party asserted that the democratic party did not know how to run the government, did not understand how to manage the financial part of it, and when they again assumed the reins of power they would demonstrate how to do and what to do very soon. The republicans have control now, and the people have now

EDEN NEBAKER, of Covington, again "got left" in his desire to be chairman of the republican State central committee, a man named Hernley, from New Castle defeating him. Nebaker appears to be a back number in his party.

THE COUNTY DEBT.

The debt of this county has been reduced within the past three or four years until now it amounts to about \$30,000. It is a long time since Montgomery county has been entirely free from debt, and it would be indeed a satisfaction to have it that way again, and keep it that way too. Taxes could then be reduced. However it seems impossible in most counties to prevent the politicians from piling some debt or other upon the people on some pretext and therefore keeping the taxes up to a high notch, and doubtless they soon will here.

THE general sentiment among the democracy of this district appears to be favorable to the nomination of a straight-out democrat for Representative in Congress in this district this year. And this is the right view to take of it. Nothing tends more to the future demoralization of any party than to continually seek for nominees who are only partially with you in political belief and action? And again what have you gained even if you elect such nominee. Only a temporary victory, which does no good.
