THE CRACK ASTOR BATTERY.

A Number of Collegians and Athletes Rush to Join It.

John Jacob Astor's battery of light artillery will be one of the smartest commands of the United States army in the Philippine islands. Its members will be of the finest type. During the five hours its recruiting office was open the other day good looking, well made, athletic young fellows were constantly crowding up to the desk, eager to enlist.

Henry B. Ely, Colonel Astor's business representative, had the room opened at 10 a.m. For hours before that time men had been assembling in the corridor. When the door was opened, they hurried forward to enroll their names. Harvey Durkee, son of General Durkee and a former member of the Seventh regiment, enrolled the names of the applicants.

Lieutenant Peyton C. March, Fifth United States artillery, who has been detailed to command the battery with the rank of captain, saw that more than 100 men were in line. He determined to weed out any undesirable candidates at once. He called them all together.

"I want you men to understand what kind of a battery you are getting into," he said. "Any of you who think we are going to organize for parade may as well go away and save the time of the recruiting officer. This battery is to be a part of the regular army of the United States. We want no one here who does not want to fight. I received word recently that as soon as it is equipped the battery is to go to the Philippines for service. All who enlist here join the United States army for three years. There is no connection between this organization and the militia. All the officers of this battery, commissioned and noncommissioned, will be detailed from the United States army. All of you who do not care to join under these conditions may go."

"Hurrah!" shouted a dozen of the most patriotic men. The others looked serious or smiled, according to their dispositions. Not one man went away. Altogether they were a fine bunch, the kind of material that any good captain would like to drill and fight with—New York World.

AFRAID OF ITS OWN CHILD.

The Republican Party Now Seeks to Discredit the Greenback.

The Republican party has steadily boasted its invention of the greenback, the blood stained greenback, as Dick Oglesby called it. The greenback is a noninterest bearing obligation, and more than 30 years after the civil war, during which the country's soldiers and sailors were paid in greenbacks, hundreds of millions of them are still in circulation. It was suggested by Secretary Gage, not, however, with the full assent of the president, that steps be taken by the issuance of interest bearing bonds to redeem, retire and destroy greenbacks. This party has refused to do.

The blood stained Republican created greenback is still a feature of the national currency. Now that more currency is needed for the prosecution of another war the Republican house says issue interest bearing bonds. The senate, however, hears a report from its finance committee to the effect that in providing more money resort may again be had to that form of government obligation which costs nothing but printing. There is no gain in this plan for the money loaner. If there be loss, it must fall on everybody. Thus the currency problem returns to plague the inventor of the greenback, the Republican party, which is now seeking to discredit the money it once took credit for supplying. This is absolute proof that the Republican party of today is no longer the party of Lincoln, who was a real follower of Jefferson.

POLITICAL GENERALS.

Army Disorganized by Placing Rich Incompetents In Command.

Political generals are a nuisance. Why should President McKinley create more of the nuisance instead of abating it? McKinley has sent the names of a lot of civilians to the senate to be confirmed, and the men bearing these names are to be appointed to high positions in the army over the heads of deserving and experienced officers who have spent their lives in the service of the country. This is all wrong. The senate can do no better and no more patriotic thing than to refuse confirmation. If Mr. McKinley has political debts to pay, let him pay them in some other manner.

It is disorganized to the army to place these rich political nobodies in command. It is a disgrace and a danger. Political pull, wealth, the fact that a young man is the son of a famous father, do not fit him for a place of command in the army. This country wants fighters who know their business, who have seen service, at the head of its regiments. If the young fellows want to fight, there are plenty of places for them in the ranks. Let them earn promotion as their fathers did before them, and let the true and faithful officers who have already earned promotion receive it.

WORLD'S SUPPLY OF GOLD.

Inadequate to Furnish Money for the Increasing Demands of Business.

When defeated in their attempts to overthrow the quantitative theory, the gold men fall back on their last defense and claim that, whether the theory applies or not, as we have sufficient gold already lack of it cannot account for the fall of prices. It is true that the annual production of gold is now about double what it was in 1873. But has the increase been sufficient to keep up with the enlarged demand for it, due to increasing business and to supply the nations that have gone over to a gold basis since 1873 and to fill the void caused by demonetizing silver?

It is not fair to assume, as the gold men do, that the entire annual product of gold goes into coinage, for it is undisputed that more than one-half is used in the arts. Nor is it fair to take the world's annual coinage, for much of this is recoinage. But if every ounce of gold has been coined and gone into circulation it would not have begun to furnish money enough to keep up with the increased demand due to increase in business and population. Even the increase in gold and silver together would not have been sufficient.

Gold Standard.

The shrinkage of values in the United States since 1873 has not been less than \$20,000,000,000, or eight times the cost of the civil war, as shown by Senator Chandler and others. But even this enormous sum does not measure the whole loss. Factories have been closed and millions of men thrown out of employment whose labor would have increased the wealth of the United States to the extent of \$5,000,000,000 annually, as estimated by that eminent political economist, Henry Carey Baird of Philadelphia. An amount of interest has been paid upon the national debt of the United States greater than the original principal, and also three-fifths of the debt itself, and yet the remaining two-fifths requires more of the produce of industry to cancel it than the whole debt did originally at the prices then existing.

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
