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

### HERO WORSHIP.

This country is now enjoying a season of hero worship. It was Dewey at the beginning of the worship to which has been added Sampson, Schley, Hobson and others. The stock of heroes of the late civil war is almost gone, and the public taste demands a new supply.

This Spanish war is developing them, and if continued there will be plenty. How prone we are to hero worship. Six months ago this country knew neither Dewey nor Hobson. They appear in finely illustrated books and newspapers, in wall pictures and even on floor rugs. We must have heroes of some kind. Although our present heroes have had brief careers as fighters they seem doomed to as much praise as Gen. Grant or Admiral Farragut. Dewey and Sampson engaged in no naval battles until this year, yet we are already giving them as much praise as Commodore Perry or any other naval commander of other days has ever received. We "slop over" too much under the circumstances, and if any of our present naval commanders should meet with reverses, be defeated, how the worship would quickly cease.

### THE CUBANS.

In turning over the island of Cuba to us the United States has undoubtedly secured a white elephant and which for years will give this country much trouble and expense. The Cubans, judging from what is now said about them, are totally unfit for self government. Like wild animals they will have to be disciplined for years before having the island turned over to them to control. Their present disposition as exhibited seems to be to eat and to pilage. They have been of little benefit to the army of this country thus far in the war. They do not seem even to make laborers in any capacity, but at all times are ready to eat. It will probably be a half century before the Cubans will be in a suitable condition to have the island turned over to them for their management and government.

### TIRED OF POPULISM.

They evidently are sick of populism in the south, judged at least by the results of the election in Alabama last week. Populists, republicans and all other parties combined against the democracy, but were defeated by a majority ranging from 60,000 to 65,000. Populistic ideas and aims are evidently unpopular in Alabama, and no where else do they seem to gain any advocates within the past four years.

### THESE "GOOD TIMES."

In spite of McKinley and prosperity there continues to be failures of many business houses in various parts of the country, there being quite a number of houses forced to the wall last week. With the government spending a million dollars a day, and with good crops of wheat, hay and oats in almost every locality, business should be good with almost all classes. Yet it is not. The want of money is felt in thousands of localities, the meeting of financial obligations is as difficult now as in any time in a year past, and business in most lines not at all lively or energetic as it should be. The financial management of affairs still appears to be as heretofore directed by Wall street. There is no improvement whatever in the money situation and there will not be under republican management. There will not be until the silver doctrine prevails, until silver is restored to its position in the circulating medium of the country, and until others aside from bond holders, monopolists, etc., are permitted to control the monetary interests of the country.

LARGE numbers of republican delegates to their State convention at Indianapolis last week opposed Hart, the candidate for Auditor of State, because he enforced in strict terms the null law which cuts off perquisites of office and allows officials only the exact amounts that the law says they are entitled to. It would seem from this that large numbers of people would take advantage of any law providing it would put money into their pockets. The honest voters of Hart's party should illustrate their professions by supporting him, but party feeling revenge may make the result otherwise. If elected he will still exercise his right as Auditor to continue to cut off perquisites. Now the question is does his party want that kind of a man in office?

It is said by republican financiers that American silver dollars on the Philippine islands are worth as much again as Mexican silver dollars of the same weight and fineness. When making this assertion these fellows don't know they are backing up populistic doctrine, that value is created by the fiat of the government. It proves that the silver in the dollar does not determine value, but the government issuing the money. These fellows prove too much when trying to depreciate silver as money.

### PEACE.

Spain has at last considered that the wisest move she can make is to ask for peace, and has done so. By the treaty she will lose all her West India possessions, and likely the future control of the Philippine islands. Of course by the treaty one-half at least of the armed soldiers of the United States will be mustered out of the service. A large number must be retained, however, to preserve order in Cuba and the Philippines.

### REMOVE THEM.

Mayor Stilwell at the last council meeting called the attention of that body to the row of old rotten frame buildings on Green street south of the Ramsey block belonging to C. M. Crawford. They have long since been condemned as unsafe and also dangerous as a fire trap, he said, and are yet permitted to remain. It is suggested that the city remove them without further delay at the owner's expense which could be done.

THE Newport Hoosier State last week contained one page of sheriff sale advertisements where that official is selling real estate to pay the debts of unfortunate defendants. This is striking evidence of "good times" and McKinley prosperity," and the publisher, no doubt, trusts they will continue.
