For the past few days the Metropolitan Press has been filled with interesting (?) discussions of Fitzsimmons and Jefferies. The facilities of colleges for furnishing standard instruction must be brought to the minimum requirements or they will be condemned. Suffice to say that it will no longer be possible under this system for some young ignoramuses, without preliminary study to spend a few months at a medical college and then go forth to prey upon the lives and fortunes of the people.
