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The investigations of the relations existing in this state between employees and their corporate employers, as made by Rev. G. L. McNutt are both interesting and instructive. Mr. McNutt sought employment as a common laborer in mills and factories in order that he might gain knowledge at first hand from the standpoint of the workman. His work has been productive in the extreme of information on this question. He found that the law requiring the payment of wages weekly was being violated on the most shallow of pretexts, thus entailing much inconvenience, suffering and loss to the working man whose necessities were great, simply that the corporation might retain the use of money rightfully belonging to him. Where a large number of men were employed the aggregate of the saving to the employer was thus quite large. Yet it is simply robbing the workman of money which is his due. It is time for the labor commissioners to investigate the matter and see that justice is done. That is what they are for. They should see that the man who works gets what he has earned when he has earned it, if there be virtue in the law on the question, Mr. McNutt deserves the gratitude of every wage earner in Indiana for the earnest effort he has made to help them, and for the sacrifice he has made in a personal way, to accomplish this.

The tin plate octopus in one of the most thriving of the blood suckers, according to the testimony of manufacturer Griffiths before the Interstate Commission. The poor capitalist is making a profit of 100 per cent. and yet he thinks protection is vitally necessary to the tin plate industry. The capital of the company was inflated from \$12,000,000 to \$50,000,000 and the prices were immediately doubled. The lesson is so plain that the wayfaring man need make no blunder in his conclusions.

REPRESENTATIVE HEBBURN, of Iowa, says that he will introduce a bill providing for the construction of the Nicaragua canal so soon as Congress meets. The digging of the canal is a gigantic undertaking, and it will cost an immense sum of money. The advantages to this country should the canal be made are obvious, but it also has its disadvantages. That it will sometime be dug is beyond question. The expediency of building it now leaves room for discussion.

The taking of the census will be a task of no small degree. Some 50,000 enumerators will be employed and several thousand persons in other capacities will be required for the completion of the work. The nation has certainly become a mighty people and one of which every American should be proud.

When we hear the Boer's version of the story of military operations in South Africa, it may have a somewhat different sound from that given to the world by the British. It is not altogether unnatural that the latter should put the best foot foremost.

SENATOR MASON is getting himself on record as a foe to adulterated foods. Worse things might be charged against a statesman than that.

SOME very active liars must be abroad in South Africa if the news sent out is an indication.

Of all the idiotic and mendacious assertions that men of small caliber and less character have had the effrontery to circulate for political reasons, perhaps few have been more pitifully weak in their falsity, and painfully foolish and unpatriotic than the one recently given currency to the effect that had not Aguinaldo received assurance that he would be given the support of a considerable portion of the United States Senate, he would never have engaged in "rebellion." The author of such a silly lie should be crowned with asses ears and every John Donkey that echoes his bray should most certainly be "shot at sundown" and if that fails to effect a cure, he should be given the regulation "hundred lashes on the bare back," and yet there are men actively engaged in the occupation of public enlightenment who expect people to believe such statements. They proclaim their own wisdom and virtue and patriotism and political acumen "even from the housetops and call upon the Lord to humble the enemies of their country, and they see an enemy in every man who happens to have an opinion differing from their's. A man who would make such a charge against a portion of the Senate of the United States would be unfit to run at large, were it not for the fact that so soon as he gives utterance to such sentiments the public knows he is a fool and a liar and so writes him in the catalogue of public opinion.

It is rumored that "unexpected position" to currency reform has developed in both the House and Senate, emanating from "sound money" republicans, and for the purpose of projecting the money question into the next campaign. The truth is they dare not precipitate such a crisis as must follow such legislation, and the sole object is to fight a campaign on pledges which are never intended to be kept. How long will the people suffer such paltering policies, and permit themselves to be made a party to such a game of "fast and loose." The power is now in the hands of the Republican party. Let the people call them to an account of its use.

It is said that within a few days formal announcement will be made of the candidacy of B. F. Shively for the Democratic nomination for governor. Mr. Shively is an able man and a clean man, and would reflect credit upon himself, his party and his state as its chief executive. He was the candidate in 1896 and made a vigorous canvass. Logically he is entitled to the honor should it be deemed expedient. He will go into the convention with a strong following, no matter what other candidates may appear.

The Indiana Bureau of Statistics estimates the corn crop of this state for this year at 151,236,804 bushels the largest ever reported. Indiana is a great state.
