"CHAIN LETTERS" MAY BRING FRAUD CHARGES

Participants in "chain letter" schemes soliciting defense savings stamps are liable to charges of fraud, the Postoffice Department warned recently.

The department said such letters were flooding and that steps were being taken to "prevent the victimizing of postal patrols in a scheme which is defrauding participants in many sections of the country."

This applies to sealed letters with a 3-cent stamp thereon, as well as an unsealed one. Several have been sent in this community and several have been seen.
