### THE GREAT POSTPONER

When Mr. Bryan characterized Hon. William Howard Taft as "the great postponer" he gave a clear definition of the attitude of Mr. Roosevelt's candidate. Mr. Taft has admitted that there is much to be done before the people will get their due, but he does not think anything ought to be done yet, not while a presidential election is pending.

Even as to the tariff, which is robbing the ordinary citizen to the point of impoverishment, he thinks that an attempt to stop he robbery at the forthcoming session of congress would be ill-advised. He believes that a "promise" to revise the tariff "after the election" will fool the people once more. But there are some Republicans who are skeptical about the expediency of such a program. A Washington letter quotes one of them as saying:

"In the year preceding the campaign of 1904 Republican leaders assured and reassured the country that the tariff would be revised after the national election. But it was not revised and there is a feeling now that Taft's promises may be as barren of results as were the promises of other Republican leaders four years ago."

## A LEAGUE MEETING

Managers Plan for the Season of 1908

ANOTHER SESSION IN DECEMBER

To Elect President and Formulate Plans—Pennant Will be Awarded at That Time.

L. A. Holthouse returned this morning from Indianapolis, where on yesterday he attended a meeting of the managers of the Indiana-Ohio league and business matters of this organization were talked over and closed up for the year of 1907. The meeting was one of the most enthusiastic yet held by this organization, every city in the league being represented. President Kling presided over the meeting and upon the opening of the session he offered his congratulations to Mr. Holthouse upon his success of winning the pennant and he in turn was congratulated by every manager present. The matter of turning back to the respective club owners their checks for one hundred dollars, which were placed in the president's hands to guarantee that each team would finish the season was carried out and this little amount may help several of the club owners in paying some of the debts contracted during the season. Each manager then filed a list of his players and President Kling will at once file the list with the National commission and try to reserve every man for next season. He has been in correspondence with this commission and the league will undoubtedly be under the National league protection next season. Several other minor details were carried out and it was unanimously decided that a meeting would be held some time during December at which time a president will be elected for the year 1908. Some dissatisfaction has been expressed toward President Kling, and it is possible some new man will be at the head of the league next year. The matter of awarding the pennant was forced to be continued until the next meeting, owing to the fact that the emblem had not as yet arrived. The meeting then adjourned and at the next meeting it will be determined what cities will be represented in the league, and it is understood that several new towns are demanding admittance.
