The financial letter from Wall street to the Record-Herald said among other things yesterday: Not long ago it was impossible to find men willing to bet on Bryan's success even though odds as high as 5 to 1 were offered against the Democratic candidate, while today offers of 1 against 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ on Bryan's chances are made by Taft supporters, with requests of odds of 1 to 3.
