BURIAL TOMORROW

Remains of the Late Jacob Mangold Will Be Laid to Rest

HELD FIVE DAYS

Awaiting the Arrival of Mrs. Earl Taylor, Daughter of Deceased

Mrs. Earl Taylor, daughter of the late Jacob Mangold, arrived this afternoon from her home in Portland, Oregon, to attend the funeral of her father. Since her arrival the arrangements for the funeral have been completed, the funeral to be held tomorrow afternoon. Brief services will be held at the home at one-thirty o'clock followed by services at the M. E. church at two o'clock. Rev. Wilcox to officiate. The remains of the deceased have been preserved for five days, the daughter having notified the relatives that she would leave at once for this city. Decatur folk are loath to lose the companionship of such an estimable citizen as was Mr. Mangold. His career has been one of usefulness and as a citizen he was loyal to principles which were right. His wife having died ten years ago, the children are now bereft of parentage, a double sorrow which to them is almost insupportable. The services of tomorrow will be marked for their appropriateness and it is expected that a large audience will be present to pay their last respects. Cardiac failure due to calcareous deposits on the mitral and tricuspid valves and fatty degeneration of the base of the heart is the cause given for the death of the most estimable man.
