HE WILL NOT INTERFERE.

Governor Marshal Will Permit the
Pardon Board to Act.

Indianapolis, February 19.—Governor
Marshal informed the state board of
pardons that the board's decision
would be final in all recommendations
for pardons so far as his office was
concerned. The governor had a brief
interview with the state board. Gov-
ernor Marshal talked to the board
along the line of a letter which he
sent to the members a few days ago.
In his letter he said: "As a general
rule I do not propose to interfere with
your conduct except when it may be
necessary to do so to preserve the
health of a prisoner. I will not prom-
ise that when a prisoner has long been
confined in the penitentiary under life
sentence that I may not vary this
rule. But my intention is to have you
discharge the duties of the state
board of pardons." One of the mem-
bers of the board said yesterday that
Governor Hanly, during his adminis-
tration, turned down at least 11 per
cent of the recommendations which
the board made. "I propose," said
Governor Marshal, "to accept the
recommendations made by the board.
The members are supposed to know
of the merits of each case and when
the board makes a recommendation
I certainly shall see that it is carried
out."

ried there helpless and moaning was
indescribably pitiful. As only a
mother can, Mrs. Touhey wept bitter-
ly, and the intensity of the grief of
those near to the man cannot be
reckoned when the statement was
given out that he probably could
never walk again without the use of
crutches. Sorrow and misfortune
never came so forcibly to a Decatur
family as did it this morning to them.
Mr. Touhey had learned to walk about
the city without a guide. In a small
way he was enjoying life by the as-
sociation of his friends, and they are
innumerable, but that he will never
again be able to walk to and fro
as before is awful to contemplate.
The sympathy of all go out to him
and the relatives in the hour of be-
reavement.
