DIED OF HEART FAILURE

Judge Ballard of Anderson, Died Last
Night.

Anderson, Ind., Aug. 4—Judge G. A.
Ballard, one of the oldest members of
the Madison county bar, died suddenly
at ten o'clock last night of heart failure.
He had been in poor health for
a year but his death came unexpected.
He came to Elwood from Belpre, O.,
in the early seventies and was the
first city attorney of that place. He
moved to Anderson in 1886. He served
as corporation attorney for Anderson,
Pendleton and Lapel and was
solicitor for the Pennsylvania Rail-
way company. He was also general
counsel for the belt railway of Indianapolis.
The deceased was past exalted ruler of the order of Elks.
Judge Ballard leaves two children,
Otto Ballard of Houston, Texas, and
Mrs. C. M. Orland, wife of Dr. Or-
land of this city.

IT WAS SAD NEWS

Two Children of H. A. Hart-
man Were Bitten by a
Mad Dog

LETTER CAME TODAY

They Were Brought to the
Pasteur Institute for
Treatment

A letter written by Mrs. H. A.
Hartman at Boulder, Colorado, to
Miss Dotty Parent, tells of a great
misfortune to the Hartman family.

Their two children, Dale eleven years
old, and Ruth four years old, were
bitten by a mad dog and at the time
the letter was written their condition
was considered serious. On the advice
of their family physician they
left Boulder as soon as it was possible,
and will bring the two afflicted
children to Chicago, where they will
be treated at the Pasteur Institute
there. It is thought from what could
be learned in the hastily written letter,
that the accident happened some
time Monday, and it is also thought
that perhaps the Hartmans landed in
Chicago today, and it is to be hoped
that their mission will not prove in
vain. The mad dog was in reality a
pup but ten weeks old and the two
children were playing with the bloodied
canine, when it bit them and im-
mediately showed signs of madness.

Mrs. Parent who received the letter
this afternoon is just home from a
visit to Boulder. More extended word
is expected from them by tomorrow
and their many friends here are already
hoping that it will contain an
encouraging report.
