HE PAID A FINE
The Humane Society Got
After Him and it Cost His
Company Money

Kalver & Company forwarded to the
officials at Van Wert today cash in
the sum of thirteen dollars, that
amount being in demand for the pay-

K. C.'S AT MOBILE, ALABAMA

Mobile, Ala., Aug. 6.—The 27th annual
convention of the Knights of
Columbus ended last night. In a report
upon the \$500,000 endowment for
scholarships by E. H. Doyle, of Detroit,
it was announced that seventy
per cent. of the council of the order
had endorsed the fund. The movement
was endorsed by the convention
and it was decided that the amount be
collected within two years and surren-
dered to the university. The mem-
bers of the national board of directors
of the organization will be required
to attend all national conventions.
An attempt was made by the
officers and members of the directory
present to clothe the later with power
to vote in convention, but it was lost
by an overwhelming vote. Another
change effecting the membership of the
directory was one giving them
power to call a meeting at any time
and place they deemed practicable
because of the rapidity with which the
order is spreading.

tional political quarrel. The police
department caused the arrest of Fred
C. Arndt, for allowing persons other
than himself or his family in his
saloon on a holiday. Arndt, who was
once a member of the board of public
works, under Mayor Miller, is now at
outs with the administration. Arndt
and a newspaper which voiced his
contention, charged that the Sunday
closing law was violated by other sal-
loons and demanded a strict espionage
of all the saloons on Sundays, among
them the mayor's saloon, if the
Arndt case should be prosecuted.

Five Children of H. A. Hart-
man Are Under Care of
Physician

PASTEUR INSTITUTE

Mad Dog Bites Children and
Later Died from the
Rabies

The canine which several days ago
bit two children of Mr. and Mrs. H.
A. Hartman at Boulder, Colorado, has
died from rabies, according to a let-
ter received from Mr. Hartman today,
and now the family is much alarmed
about the youths who were victims of
the mad animal. It will be remem-
bered that the children bitten were taken
to the Pasteur Institute at Chicago,
at once for treatment, and the father
and mother were at their bedside.
Since the dog died the physician at
the institute has advised that the other
three boys be brought to Chicago
for treatment, as he feared that the
dog may have nipped them also. The
boys were sent for immediately
and now the entire family is at Chi-
cago. The condition of the two bitten
is serious, although it is thought
that with the best of care they can be
restored to health. The Hartmans are
certainly having their share of
misfortune.
