K. C.'S AT MOBILE, ALABAMA

Mobile, Ala., Aug. 6.—The 27th annual convention of the Knights of Columbus ended last night. In a report upon the \$500,000 endowment for scholarships by E. H. Doyle, of Detroit, it was announced that seventy per cent. of the councils of the order had endorsed the fund. The movement was endorsed by the convention and it was decided that the amount be collected within two years and surrendered to the university. The members of the national board of directors of the organization will be required to attend at national conventions. An attempt was made by the officers and members of the directory present to clothe the later with power to vote in convention, but it was lost by an overwhelming vote. JUST A FACTIONAL QUARREL

Michigan City, Ind., Aug. 6.—The threatened crusade against the saloons of this city grew out of a factional political quarrel. The police department caused the arrest of Fred C. Arndt, for allowing persons other than himself or his family in his saloon on a holiday. Arndt, who was once a member of the board of public works, under Mayor Miller, is now at outs with the administration. Arndt and a newspaper which voiced his contention, charged that the Sunday closing law was violated by other saloons and demanded a strict espionage of all the saloons on Sundays, among them the mayor's saloon, if the Arndt case should be prosecuted.

Five Children of H. A. Hartman Are Under Care of Physician

PASTEUR INSTITUTE

Mad Dog Bites Children and Later Died from the Rabies

The canine which several days ago bit two children of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Hartman at Boulder, Colorado, has died from rabies, according to a letter received from Mr. Hartman today, and now the family is much alarmed about the youths who were victims of the mad animal. It will be remembered that the children bitten were taken to the Pasteur Institute at Chicago, at once for treatment, and the father and mother were at their bedside. Since the dog died the physician at the institute has advised that the other three boys be brought to Chicago for treatment, as he feared that the dog may have nipped them also. The boys were sent for immediately and now the entire family is at Chicago. The condition of the two bitten is serious, although it is thought that with the best of care they can be restored to health. The Hartmans are certainly having their share of misfortune.

MRS. POWERS DEAD

Mother of Mrs. Andrew Welfley Passes Away

DIED THIS MORNING

At the Home of Her Daughter—Services Sunday

Mrs. Helen Powers, aged eighty-three, mother of Mrs. Andrew Welfley, of this city, and who for fifteen months has made her home in this city died this morning at six o'clock after suffering for more than a year from creeping paralysis, the disease assuming an acute form some time ago. The aged woman made her home with her son, A. V. Powers, at Fort Wayne, until she came to this city. The decedent was born in Fort Wayne and she was the first child born in the county of Allen, therefore being the oldest pioneer of our sister government. During the past three weeks the afflicted woman has suffered intensely and although she rallied several times it was known that death was not far distant. The deceased was married August tenth, 1848, and eight children were born to the union, three of whom have preceded their mother to the eternal world. The surviving children are Mrs. Mecca Welfley, Decatur; A. V. Powers, Fort Wayne; Mrs. Helen Willets, Indianapolis; Mrs. Florence Bradberry, Greensburg. The funeral services will be held from the Welfley home Sunday morning shortly after nine o'clock, Rev. Powell officiating, after which the remains will be conveyed to Fort Wayne for burial.
