Two Young Men From Kokomo Tried to Cash Forged Draft There Today.

THE PRIMERO VICTIMS

Fifty-Two Were Laid to Rest at Catholic Cemetery at Trinidad.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Feb. 2.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Boyd Dinnius and Chester Gano, two young men from Kokomo, Ind., were arrested here this morning, charged with trying to cash a forged draft for \$150 on the First National bank. Their cases were continued until tomorrow.

Primero, Col., Feb. 2.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—At noon today fifty-two bodies have been taken from the mines of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company here. Until today none but the coroner and the jury were allowed to see the bodies of the victims, but this morning friends and relatives of the men passed into the machine shop which had been fitted up as the temporary morgue, and where the bodies were prepared for burial. The bodies were today conveyed to the Catholic cemetery at Trinidad, where the graves have been prepared. Three huge drays were used as hearses to convey the caskets from the train to the cemetery.

NOTICE TO MILK DEALERS.

All persons selling milk and cream, and those wishing to sell milk and cream within the city of Decatur, must between this and the 31st day of January, 1910, file certificates of examination of their cow or cows with the secretary of the city board of health. Said examinations must be made by a licensed veterinary surgeon. No license to sell milk and cream will be issued to any one until the proper certificates of examination of their cows are filed with the board of health. Any one violating this ordinance will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. Remember, that the time expires after January 31, 1910. The law requires these certificates of examination to be filed twice a year, in January and June of each year.
