Wednesday, June 22, 1916, is a date which will be famed in the decades and centuries to come, because on that day the first scheduled trip was made in an airship for the purpose of carrying passengers. The big ship—and it is big—being 485 feet long and forty-six feet wide—is the Deutschland, owned by Count Zeppelin, who was himself at the helm. It flew from Friedrichshafen to Dusseldorf, Germany, 206 miles, in nine hours, and from now on will make regular runs each day. Another census taking season will mark a wonderful change in this land when all principal cities will likely be connected by air lines.

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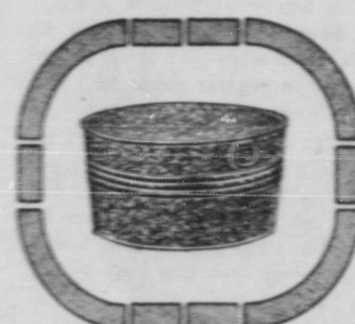
