A SANE

FOURTH IN 1911.

A well known Decatur business man has suggested that this is the time that we should begin agitating a sane fourth for next year. He argues that at this time the merchants have closed out their stocks, and that if they know that the sale of fire crackers and other dangerous shootin' things will be prohibited next year, they will not invest in this line. If an ordinance is necessary this would be the time to adopt it, it is argued. The sane fourth idea as used in Chicago, Indianapolis and other large cities this year reduced wonderfully the number of dead and injured, and the time is coming when state or national laws will prohibit the firing of fireworks that are as liable to tear off an arm or leg as do anything else. The accidents in this locality this year were more frequent than usual, and a majority of the people would likely favor such ordinances as would prevent a repetition of them next year.
