Father George, until a few months ago was assistant to Father Wilken of this city.

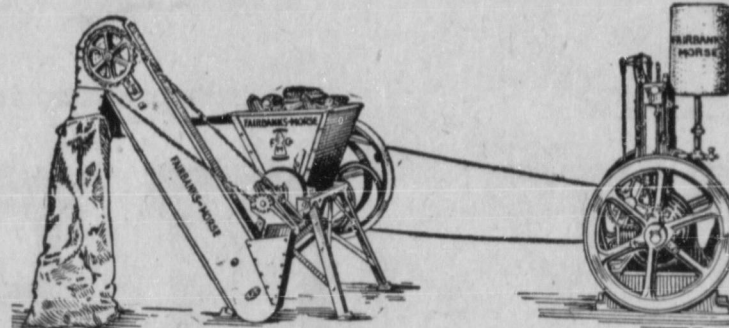
