### ANOTHER MICHIGAN BEET GROWER HERE.

Mr. William Ceaser, of Middleton, Mich., is here with the object of renting a farm on which to raise beets. He is quite enthusiastic regarding beet raising and well he can be. He is showing a certificate of deposit for \$300, which is the net profit on 6% acres of beets after paying for the labor, rent of ground and seed. That beats the ordinary crops a mile.

Get ready to put part of your beets in as soon as the ground is warm enough to sprout the seed quickly and then hold back three or four weeks before you put in the balance of your field. In that way you will not bring all the work together, but will give the laborers plenty of time to do the thinning.

In normal seasons you can plant beets from April 15th to June 15th, and we have known of many fields planted in July in Michigan that turned out good profitable crops. Some years the early planted beets are the best, while other years the late planted are best, so if you plant part of your beets early and part of them later, you will have a better crop.
