A FINE MODEL

For Adams County's Soldiers' Memorial Submitted by Sculptor Mulligan

OF ART INSTITUTE

Of Chicago—Met With Committee—Fine Piece of Art Work Praised.

Charles F. Mulligan, noted sculptor, and lecturer on sculpture in the Art Institute of Chicago, met with the soldiers' memorial committee at the Bowers Realty office Friday evening and presented to them his plaster model for the soldiers' memorial. The committee was well pleased with the design in all ways, and it will be given favorable consideration. The model was made by Mr. Mulligan from his own plans, which are artistic in the extreme. The memorial as represented in his plan, is of granite and bronze. It is eighteen feet high and twenty-five by fifteen feet in length and breadth. The monument is mounted by a statue of the goddess of liberty, and at her side lie the coat of arms and emblems of the various departments of the army body. All the names of the soldiers of the county, both living and dead, are given place in engraving on the memorial, and on one side, a profile of Lincoln and a copy of his Gettysburg address. Places for other appropriate inscriptions and plates were denoted, and all in all, the work was considered a fine one for the proposed \$10,000 memorial. Mr. Mulligan made the model free of all cost, and will be considered with any others that may be presented.
