Decatur Packing Company's Plant Will be Sold to the Highest Bidder.

ON JANUARY 17TH

Mr. Chatlin, the Manager, Expects to Leave Soon for the West.

The Decatur Packing company's plant, located along the Erie tracks, will be put up at auction Friday, January 17th, at 10 o'clock a. m., and will positively be sold to the highest bidder on said date. The company was organized and erected the present buildings in 1907, putting up one of the most complete concerns of its kind and size in the country, installing the latest and most up-to-date machinery, and complete facilities in every respect for packing purposes. Owing to some rather poor management, however, the company did not meet with the success that the promoters expected it to and several years later it was put into the hands of a receiver.

Mr. Charles Chatlin then purchased it and has been managing it up to the present time. Mr. Chatlin has received a very flattering proposition which will take him into the western states and which also necessitates his selling his interests here.
