

The Bede-Seidel Debate on "Socialism" a Notable Event



FEW features of the Chautauqua here will cause more widespread interest than the debate on "Socialism" between Hon. J. Adam Bede, who was for eight years Republican congressman from Minnesota, and Hon. Emil Seidel, recently Socialist mayor of Milwaukee. Both Socialists and anti-Socialists will want to hear this debate. It has been placed on the evening program in order that everybody will be able to be there.

Hon. J. Adam Bede is one of the best speakers on the Chautauqua platform today. During the time that he occupied a seat in our national legislative halls he was known as "the humorist of the house," so witty were his sayings and so excellent his humor. Often when in the midst of the ordinary work of congress, when there were many empty seats and general listlessness, Bede would rise to speak. Immediately the empty seats would fill and the feeling change to one of intense interest. In presidential campaigns Bede has made speaking tours on which he has been given the biggest city dates by the Republican national committee.

Hon. Emil Seidel acquired his earnestness and conscientious spirit at the pattern maker's bench. He was born in Pennsylvania, but left with his parents for Milwaukee at the age of five. At the age of twenty-two he went abroad to perfect himself in his trade of carving and designing. For six years he lived in Berlin, working by day and attending trade school at night. In 1884 he helped to organize the Woodcarvers. He later joined the Milwaukee Association of Pattern Makers. In 1892 his ballot was one of a total of two Socialist votes in his precinct. In 1910 he was elected mayor of Milwaukee on the Socialist ticket and is today regarded as one of the leading Socialists of the United States.

PETITION FOR MACADAM ROAD.

State of Indiana, County of Adams, ss: Before the Board of Commissioners of the County of Adams, July Term, 1913.

We, the undersigned, each and all of whom are resident adult freeholders and voters of Root township, in Adams County, Indiana, respectfully petition your honorable body and ask that you construct and complete a free macadamized stone road in said township over and upon the public highway situated upon the following route, to-wit:

Commencing at the end of the terminus of the Joseph Steigmyer Macadam Road, which is at a point about 40 rods east of the northwest corner of the southwest quarter of section twenty-eight (28), township twenty-eight north, range fourteen (14) east, in Adams County, Indiana, running thence in a northerly direction following the public highway crossing the northwest quarter of section twenty-eight (28), aforesaid, and the northeast quarter of section twenty-nine (29), thence crossing section twenty (20), and the northeast quarter of section (19), all in township twenty-eight (28) north, range fourteen (14) east, and terminating about 80 rods east of the northeast corner of the northwest quarter of section (19) aforesaid at the point where the proposed improvement intersects with the Macadam Road extending west on the northern boundary of said section nineteen (19) aforesaid.

Your petitioners aver and say that the improvement prayed for is less than three miles in length, connects at both ends with a free macadam road in said township and that a United States rural mail route passes over said highway herein sought to be improved.

Your petitioners further aver and say that the highway herein sought to be improved is a public highway, already established and in use and is one of the public highways of said Root Township, and that the same will be of public utility and benefit.

Your petitioners ask that said public highway above described be drained and graded and that broken stone be placed upon the grade and that upon such broken stone there be placed stone screenings.

Your petitioners further ask that said highway above described be improved to the width of forty feet, and that said highway above described be graded to a width of twenty-four feet, and that broken stone be placed thereon to a width of ten feet and to a depth of eight inches at the sides thereof and to a depth of ten inches in the center thereof, and that crushed stone screenings be placed thereon to a depth of 4 inches upon such broken stone, that said improvement be made a doubletrack and that the name of the same be "The John A. Fuhrman Macadam Road."

That to pay for said improvement we ask that bonds be issued by the County of Adams in the State of Indiana, payable in twenty semi-annual installments or series and for the payment of which we ask that a tax be levied upon the taxable property of said Root Township in a sufficient amount to pay the interest and principal of said bond as they become due.

That said improvement be made and constructed and that said bonds be issued and said tax be levied upon the taxable property of said township in accordance with the acts of the legislature of the State of Indiana passed in the year 1905, beginning on page 550, and as amended in the acts of 1907, and as also amended in the acts of 1909, now in force, provided for the extension of free gravel or macadam roads and all other and any amendments thereto.

We further ask the board to take all the necessary steps required by law to have said improvement constructed and made as petitioned herein and that the same be constructed without submitting the question of building the same to an election of the voters of said Root township and that the board construct the same under the laws of the State of Indiana, providing for the extension of free gravel or macadam roads, by township taxation.

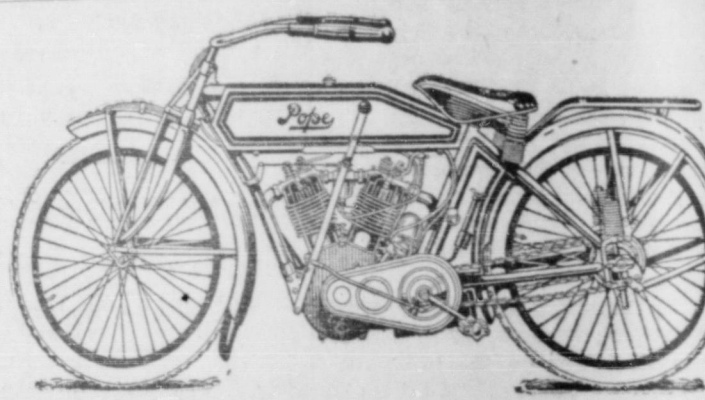
