### Operation Performed Upon Lon Klopfenstein for Appendicitis Wednesday.

### Miss Rose Fuhrman Doing Well Since Operation at Lutheran Hospital.

Lon Klopfenstein, sixteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Klopfenstein, of Preble, underwent a very serious operation Wednesday afternoon between 4 and 5 o'clock at the Hope hospital, Fort Wayne, for the removal of his appendix. Lon was in a very serious condition at the time of the operation and had been that way since last Sunday, he having suffered a severe attack, at which time the attendants thought that probably the appendix had broken. The operation was performed by Dr. Duemling and from the present outlook it was a very successful one. Mr. Klopfenstein has been a sufferer from appendicitis since last April and had three attacks during that period, the fourth coming during that period, the fourth coming continue to improve and be able to return to his home in about three weeks. Mrs. Klopfenstein is at the hospital with her son.
