A LAST WORD

Mr. Voter:—The city campaign is closing. As a last appeal to you we ask you to vote for the democratic nominees. At the head of the ticket is Charles Christen, every inch a mayor, who stands for the following:

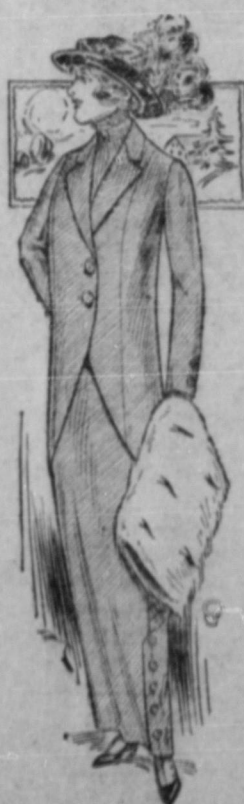

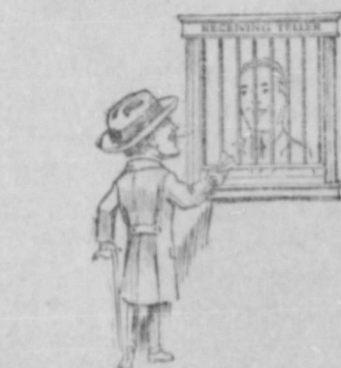
