Curtis Campbell Qualifies as Administrator of the Estate

OF LATE FATHER

Tinkham-Hakes Partition Case Set for March 20—Probate Matters.

The partition case of Non-Tinkham et al. vs. J. Walker Hakes, has been set for trial March 20.

In the Adams Bros. Co. vs. Rhody Rink et al. quiet title case, the bill of exception containing this evidence was signed and sealed by the judge and ordered made a part of the record, and filed with the clerk.

In the matter of the claim of Wm. C. Baker against the John P. Baker estate, Peterson & Moran being of counsel for the estate and for the claimant, C. J. Linn is appointed counsel for the estate in the cause. It is set for trial for March 7.
