RACING CARS ARE HERE.

All of the giant racing cars which are to take part in the big automobile races to be staged at the Decatur fair on Wednesday afternoon, when Terrible Teddy Totzlauff, speed king, Billy Carlson, DeAlere and the other crack drivers, assemble to give battle for the big cash prizes offered by the fair management, arrived in Decatur last evening and are now garaged in the fine fireproof building of the Holthouse garage, where all the crack drivers with their huge cars, will make their headquarters.

The big 300 horse power "Blitzen Benz" arrived with the other cars and the latest speed creations will be tuned up by the corps of expert mechanics who travel with the racing cars.

The auto polo experts with their four fast polo cars arrived at the same time as the big racing cars, and they immediately started practice, for unlike other games, auto polo has to be kept up owing to the rough nature of the game. It is necessary to keep the drivers and mallet men hardened for the gruelling contests which they will be called upon to indulge in. There is no doubting the fact, auto polo is by far the roughest game ever invented and does not call for the services of any mollycoddles, but men of brawn and muscle.

The fair management is making preparations to handle the largest crowd ever assembled at the fair grounds on automobile day, which will be the only day on which the auto races and auto polo will be played. From here the speed kings will go west to Chicago and St. Louis, where they will close their season and return to their respective homes. Totzlauff and Captain Kennedy will return to the Pacific coast; Carlson to Detroit, Mich., where he will build his new car for the Indianapolis 500 mile race; Marston and Getz will return east to New York and Boston respectively, and Calahan, who is a product of Chicago, will return to the "windy city," where he has a large automobile business.

All of the boys will appear in Indianapolis early in May with their new speedway mounts and will begin practice on the brick course for the biggest speed battle in the world.

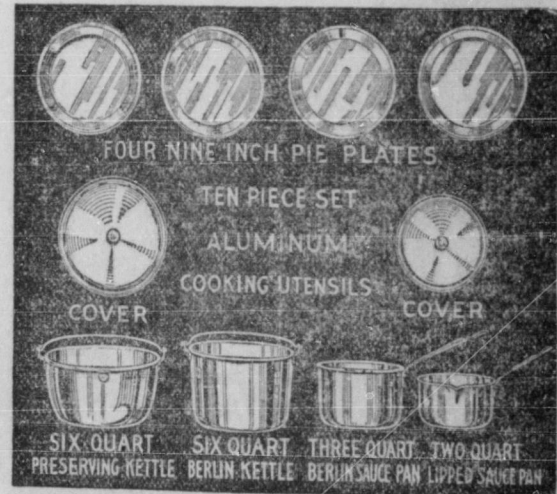
