

BONDS ARE SOLD

E. M. Campbell's Sons of Indianapolis Get \$10,000 Bond Issue for

NEW HIGH SCHOOL

A. L. Brentlinger Hired to Become Principal of the West Ward.

The city school board met this morning and sold \$10,000 worth of school bonds for the proposed new high school building to E. M. Campbell's Sons of Indianapolis, at a premium of \$58, dated November 1, 1915, and accrued interest. There were five bidders. The bonds will be taken up in two years. There is a series of twenty bonds of \$500 each. These are payable, \$2,500 semi-annually, July 16, 1916, the first payment being due. The money created by the tax levy will be sufficient to pay these off in two years and it is thought that the new high school building can be commenced in a year from January.

At a meeting last evening the school board entered into a contract with A. L. Brentlinger, a teacher of Kirkland township, to become principal and teacher of the West ward. He succeeds Lewis Adler, who will be cashier of the new bank at Preble. Mr. Brentlinger is a fine teacher and is well qualified.

The bid offered by Joseph, Joseph & Bros. represented a company composed of Joseph Bros., I. A. Kalver of this city, A. Borinstein of Indianapolis and Abe Feinburg of Muncie. Joseph Bros. have offices at Cincinnati, New York and Chicago and are known as the largest dealers of their kind in America, having last year transacted business amounting to \$21,000,000. The representative who came here today, left at once for New York City, where he will discuss with the head of the company as to placing a higher bid for the property next Tuesday.
