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### CANT STOP US:-

By the Underwood tariff law this administration has taken the tariff out of politics; by the new tariff commission it proposes to take politics out of the tariff.

Speaking at a banquet of the Republican club in New York City last January, by virtue of his life-long allegiance to the republican party, Mr. Schiff declared:

"I want to explain that nothing can stop the great prosperity we now have except a renewal of tariff agitation in the next campaign. Standing here on holy republican ground I say without fear or favor if you renew in the next presidential campaign the tariff agitation of the past, if you threaten the country and show it you want a renewal of special privilege and high protection, the people will have none of it.
