FEW MORE TO EXAMINE.

With the exception of a few registrants who will probably be placed in Class 1 by the district board, and later called by the local military board to appear for their physical examination, the local board will complete the examining of the registrants, now in Class 1, by Tuesday noon. All men already classified and finally placed in Class 1 will be examined by that time. The total in Class 1 will reach about 475. Out of this number the remaining 35 per cent draw must be sent to camp and all future calls filled. Practically three-fourths of the men passed the physical examination. Those examined today were:

ing the Germans who soon ceased. Telephone service between the front and the rear between most positions was suspended for a time today and only couriers used, in an effort to get a message back as quickly as possible, under the most difficult conditions.

Men from rest camps at all points were rushed to the front in motor trucks, where they were mobilized to repel a general attack. The maneuver was executed in the most approved manner.

Brisk artillery engagements continue, the American guns holding their own, despite superior enemy observation facilities. Two days rain has resulted in knee-deep mud along the whole front.

London, Feb. 25—(Special to Daily Democrat)—A whole raiding party was repulsed with some enemy losses east of Armentieres early today, Field Marshal Haig reported.

Enemy artillery sowed some activity in the Messines sector and south-west of Cambrai.

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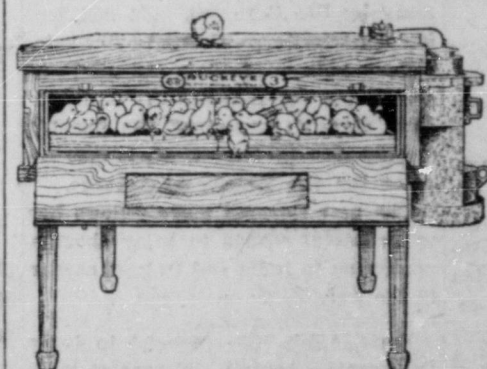
