TOUGH ON TOBACCO USERS

(United Press Service) New York, Jan. 2—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Smokers and chewers paid the war tax on tobacco the Wall Street Journal declared today in an article on the year's sales record of the American Tobacco company and Liggett & Myers.

The American sales approximate \$140,000,000 to \$145,000,000, and Liggett & Myers \$143,000,000, the financial journal announced, with the remark: "The prices of all forms of tobacco goods have been advanced at least as much as the increased amount of federal taxes."

THE FIRST COLD WAVE

(United Press Service) Chicago, Jan. 2—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Mid-America tinged today in its first spell of cold weather this season. Temperatures ranging from 16 below to a few degrees above zero, prevailed in western and mid-western states.

Aside from the cold there was little inconvenience. Low temperatures checked the snowfall and traffic was unimpeded. Relief from the chill will come Friday, weather man predicted. Freshness of the cold wave was shown in the near-zero conditions of southern and comparative warmth in the Dakotas and other northern states.
