CAME UNEXPECTEDLY At Early Hour Today—In Army Three Years and Three Months.

The home of Charles Hawkins south of the city was a pleasantly excited place this morning when they were summoned to the door at one o'clock and found that their son, Sergeant Pearl Hawkins, a member of the regular army for three years and three months, who has spent twenty months overseas, had arrived home very unexpectedly. They had word of his arrival in the States, August 4, but at that time he said a letter would follow, and as they were expecting a letter before his arrival, they were wholly unprepared for the happy surprise. It is needless to say that there was no sleep in the Hawkins household for the remainder of the night.

Mr. Hawkins' interesting letters have appeared from time to time in this paper. He was a member of the field hospital corps, and was with the Second Division. Nine months were spent in Germany.

Miles Roop of this city was with him during the entire time that they were away.

Sergeant Hawkins has nine more months to serve in his term and must report for duty at San Antonio, Texas. He was on the border prior to going across seas.

He is at home on a thirty days' furlough.

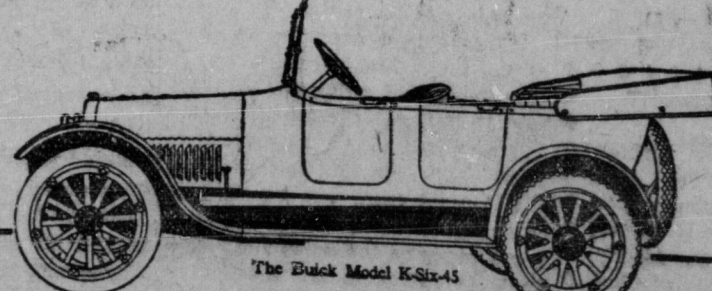


1920 Model K-45

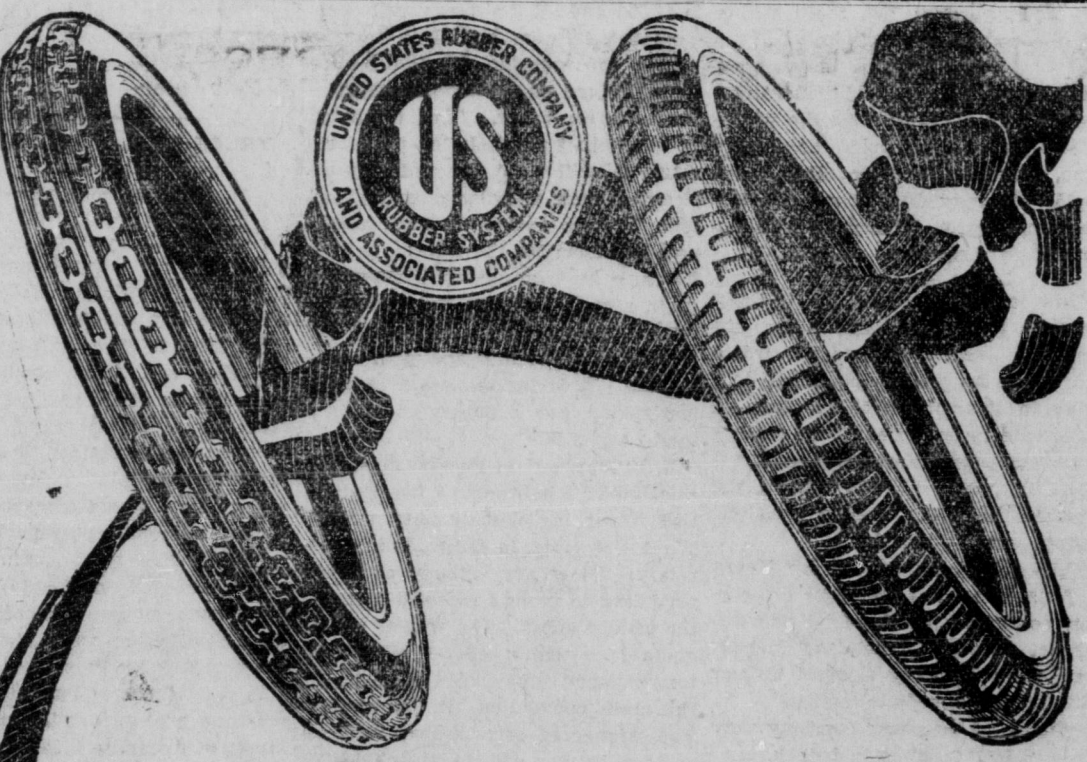
