OFFICERS AND ENLISTED MEN
ON SAME FOOTING WHEN
IT COMES TO TRAINING PAYCongress Sets Minimum Allowance
for Soldiers in Training.

Washington, Aug. 21.—By direct action

of congress officers now receive

the same pay during their course of

education with the federal board for

vocational education as enlisted men.

Formerly the monthly compensation of

the disabled man in training was

equal to the amount of his monthly

pay for the last month of his actual

service. This was paid by the bureau

of war risk insurance and the federal

board made up the difference, so that

he would receive not less than \$65 a

month. By this method officers were

paid a much larger amount than

privates. The amendment to the act,

which was passed in July, places the

entire responsibility of training pay

upon the federal board and fixes the

maximum amount of \$80 a month for

a man without dependents, regardless

of his former army pay.

Only in cases where the amount of

compensation due the man exceeds his

training pay can the bureau of war

risk insurance pay anything to either

the man or his dependents while he is

training. In a few cases of total dis-

ability the bureau is called upon to aid

to the training pay.
