Fred Robinson, Alias John Jones Who Was Sentenced to Reformatory

IN SEPTEMBER 1914

For Stealing Shoes From Box Car in Decatur Wants a Pardon.

Indianapolis, Aug. 28.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Nine "lifers" will ask clemency before the state board of pardon at its next meeting September 22 to 26th, it was announced today.

Among the "lifers" is Rae Kraus, convicted in 1904 of the murder of her daughter at Hartford City. This case has been before the board repeatedly and will be reopened.

Petitions will be received until September 12. Those on file today included:

Chester Wyson, Wells county, Feb. 14, 1919. One to 14 years, larceny.

Peter Myers, Wells county, July 19, 1918, 2 to 14, forgery. Indiana reformatory.

Fred Robinson, Alias Jones, Adams county September 1914, 1 to 8 years petit larceny, Indiana reformatory, pardon asked.

Women Preparing for Citizenship

The State Franchise League is having printed for sale to women throughout the state, who will aid in conducting "Citizenship Schools" a pamphlet entitled, "An Aid to the New Citizen of Indiana." This pamphlet has been written by Miss Martha Block of Terre Haute, and will be sold for 25c, to partially cover cost of printing.

The Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce, recognizing the important work being undertaken by the Indianapolis Franchise League, in arranging for a "Citizenship School" to be held the latter part of September, and wishing to have a share in this work, have tendered the Indianapolis League the use of their club rooms for the school. From the many inquiries pouring in, it is expected there will be at least 400 women in attendance at the classes. Evening classes will be conducted for business women who are unable to be present in the day time, and Miss Merica Haagland will be chairman of the night school. The enrollment in this school will not be confined to members of the Franchise League, but all women of the state interested in citizenship, will be admitted.

The state board of the Franchise league will meet in Indianapolis next Tuesday, September 2, and business of importance will be taken up.
