COURT HOUSE NEWS

Florence Keeler, executrix of the will of Elizabeth Willey, filed additional bond for the sale of real estate. The appraisal of the real estate was filed. A petition for the sale of the real estate should be sold to pay off debts and liabilities of the decedent's estate. CAILLAUX TRIAL BEGINS

Paris, Feb. 17.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—The French senate, sitting as a high court of justice was to convene at 1:30 p. m. today to begin the trial of Joseph Caillaux, former premier, charged with traitorous conduct toward his country during the war.

The state has summoned 51 witnesses, including Ambassador Jusserand, M. Briand, M. Viviani and M. Barthou, former premiers; Jules Cambon, former ambassador at Berlin; Maurice Paleologue, former ambassador to Russia; Ambassadors, Contt, Rio Janerio; Barrere, Rome and many other men prominent in political life.

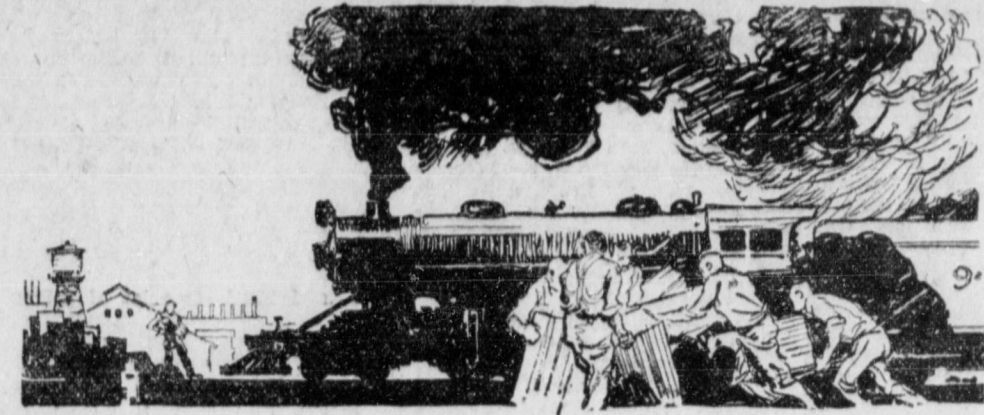

Carrying a Ton a Mile for less than a Cent

Freight rates have played a very small part in the rising cost of living.

Other causes—the waste of war, under-production, credit inflation—have added *dollars* to the cost of the necessities of life, while freight charges have added only *cents*.

The average charge for hauling a ton of freight a mile is less than a cent.

A suit of clothing that sold for \$30 before the war was carried 2,265 miles by rail from Chicago to Los Angeles for 16 1/2 cents.

Now the freight charge is 22 cents and the suit sells for \$50.

The cost of the suit has increased 20 dollars.

The freight on it has increased only 5 1/2 cents.

Other transportation charges enter into the cost of the finished article—carrying the wool to the mills and the cloth to the tailors—but these other charges amount to but a few cents more.

The \$10 pair of shoes that used to sell for \$5 goes from the New England factory to the Florida dealer for a freight charge of 5 3/4 cents—only one cent more than the pre-war rate.

Beef pays only two-thirds of a cent a pound freight from Chicago to New York.

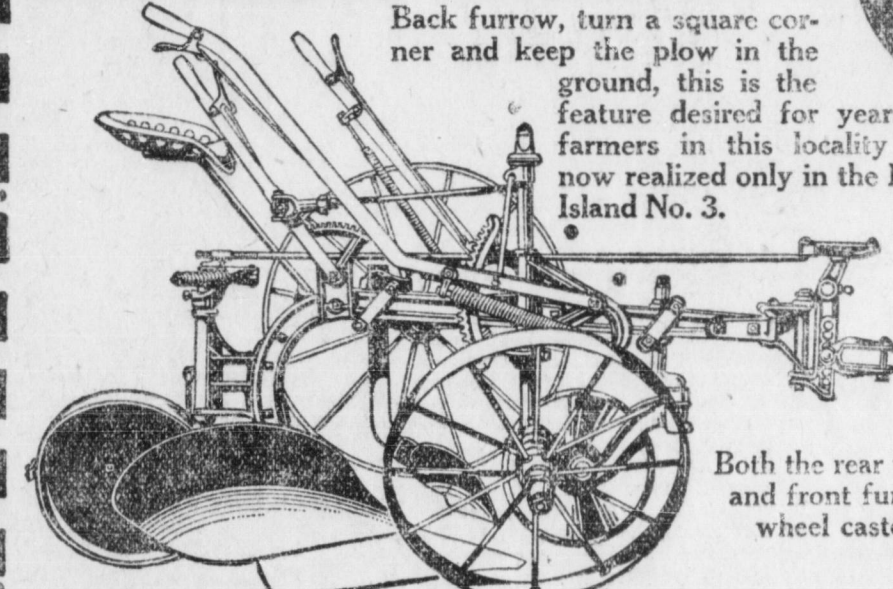

WITH THIS PLOW YOU CAN BACK FURROW SUCCESSFULLY

ROCK ISLAND No. 3 SULKY



Back furrow, turn a square corner and keep the plow in the ground, this is the feature desired for years by farmers in this locality and now realized only in the Rock Island No. 3.

Both the rear wheel and front furrow wheel caster.

The rear wheel of this sulky is unlocked automatically by the team turning in either direction. It can follow the plow; it is closer up to the bottom, so when you turn to the left you don't force the bottom away from the bank—the wheel never leaves the furrow, doesn't jump out, nor is it forced out in turning a corner. The strain on the rear wheel, axle and bracket is relieved, thus insuring longer life to the plow.

TURNS A SQUARE CORNER

The pivot of the vertical clevis on the front end of the beam permits the team to be turned in either direction, or to turn a square corner without "slewing" the ground.

The rear wheel, being located very close to the rear of the plow bottom, will caster automatically, and is brought back to place by a spring trip, which relieves the plow of lenside pressure as soon as the turn is completed.

Another reason which allows you to turn a square corner is because you can caster the front furrow wheel at any angle desired.

CUSHIONED SPRING

The short cushioned spring on the land lever relieves the strain on the plow and makes it easier for the driver when the land wheel goes over an uneven place or obstruction. This also assures the bottom of furrow always being level.

Lever ratchets, have such a fine adjustment that it is possible to open up a furrow 6 inches deep when on the level.
