## AUTO SHOWS PROVE POPULAR THIS YEAR

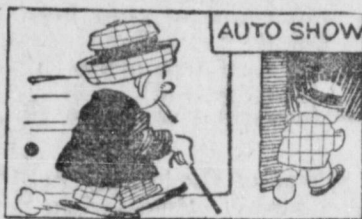
EVERYWHERE THE EXPOSITIONS OF MOTOR CARS HAVE DRAWN TREMENDOUS CROWDS.

March 2 to 6 Are Dates For Indiana's Great Show This Year; Thousands Will View the Beautiful Exhibits.

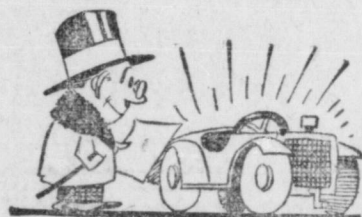

permitting of displays of every popular make of car, besides many tire and accessory exhibits, has been leased for the big event, and will accommodate thousands of spectators.

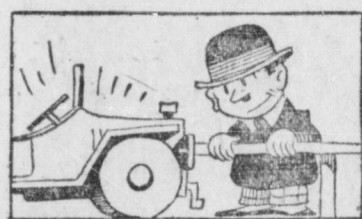

perfect automobile. And as years go on, better and better cars will be made, as the inventive genius of man increases in its marvellous unfolding of creative ideas.

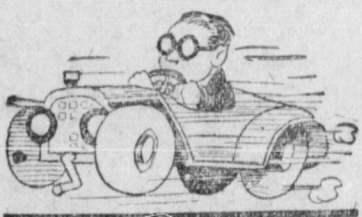
